



Getting to Know You: In essence, each participant who attends Fantasia Fair has a femme identity. Prior to the Fair you will be spending a good deal of time putting together her "image"; but, for now, we need more information about her as a "real" person. This is what our REGISTRATION APPLICATION is all about. This information is designed to do four very important things:

- · How to contact you
- · Where you want to stay
- When you will be at the Fair
- · Your payment status


Planning Your Fair

You will receive a letter which will include: (1) an Arrival Card, (2) Activity, Seminar & Workshop Check-list, (3) a "How I Will Help" (volunteer helper) form, and other information prior to the Fair. As you fill in the "Activity, Seminar & Workshop Checklist," you will be deciding what you do or do not want to do at the Fair. In short, you will be planning your Fair. We need this information to know . how to plan attendance at the various events. (Most events involving a fee require advanced registration because of quality control factors or limited facility space.) If you decide at the last minute to join a particular event, we understand. If there is space available, we will arrange it. That is why we have sisters ready to help you at our registration desk or during the week at the Fair Headquarters.

Help Wanted

The Fair is a quality program and we want everyone to have a chance to "do the whole thing." But, as we all know, we get out of a thing what we put into it. Each event has a coordinator who needs sisters to help her. Please consider volunteering to hostess an event. This may be as simple as checking the I.D. cards, to making sure that restaurant is open and ready for the guests when they arrive.

Contacting the Registration Office

Until October 15th the contact number is 617-522-6033. No collect calls please. Ask for Weslee or leave a specific message on the recorder. After October 15th, call 508-487-6424 (8AM to Midnight) and ask for Fan Fair Headquarters. If there is no answer, leave a specific message on the recorder, or with the hotel operator, mention Fantasia Fair. We are sorry but we cannot return long distance calls unless you indicate that we can reverse the charges and to whom. The Inns all have a number for receiving messages for guests, and they will try to reach you by leaving a message at the front desk or by posting a note on your door. Most of the Apartments have their own phones.

Initial Check-In

If you have paid all your registration fees by the September 5 deadline, you should receive the following: your reservation confirmation; optional program selection sheet, volunteer sheet and arrival card; and Follies and Fashion Show participation cards which all should be filled out and returned ASAP. On arriving Sunday, Oct. 19, you may go directly to your Inn, get comfortable, leave your car there (parking is always at a premium) and walk to the Pilgrim House, 336 Commercial St (hard to find as it is tucked back up a long walk way). Registration starts at 3 PM. Let the Registration Staff know that you have arrived, pick up your packet, then start mingling with the other attendees and have fun. If you have not paid in full before your arrival, you must go directly to The Pilgrim House to pay the balance before checking in to your Inn.

Sunday, after 7 PM, you will find the Staff at the Welcoming Buffet Reception at the Pilgrim House and they may be able to help you with a partial check-in. If you arrive very late Sunday night, you may go to your designated Inn and, if your payments are in order, the inn keeper should be able to accommodate you. If you think you will not be able to arrive on the day you designated, please call Weslee and give an estimated time of arrival.

The Fair Business Office

The Fair Headquarters, located on the 2nd floor of the Pilgrim House, will be open from 9AM-12 noon and 2-5PM Monday thru Saturday. The volunteer staff will be delighted to answer any questions, help you sign up for paid programs and help as needed. During the period of the Fair the phone number will be 508-487-6424.





Policies

Payments, Cash, Credit and Check Cashing

Final payments for the Fair are due September 5, 1997. Any outstanding balance on your registration fee should be mailed in time to be received no later than Sept. 5, to: Registrar, PO Box 02130, Boston MA 02208. If, for any reason, you cannot meet this deadline, you must make arrangements, in writing, with Weslee Avery to pay at the Fair with cash, traveler's checks, Mastercard or Visa (Note: a 5% donation is requested to cover the additional service fee for credit card payments. No personal checks can be accepted at the Fair.). If you still have a balance due on seminars you have chosen , they may be paid for at Registration.

It is extremely difficult to cash personal checks anywhere in Provincetown (including the banks). ATM withdrawals and cash advances on credit cards can be made at most banks.

Registrant Participation & Guests

Any persons may attend any of the public events of Fantasia Fair for the stated admission price. These events include the Diversity Dinner, The FanFair Fashion Show, the Follies and the Fantasy Ball. All other events, luncheon seminars, workshops, receptions, and banquets are open only to registered participants of Fantasia Fair. This policy is designed to preserve the quality of the programs, recognize the support of the registered participants and insure that there is adequate seating space for Fair attendees. Previous Fair attendees will be accepted at these events on a space available basis.

ID Cards

487-1279

FanFair ID cards will be issued at registration. This card serves as your admission to shows, events, parties, banquets, etc. Please be sure to have it with you at all times. You may be denied admission without the card.

Arrival Card

An Arrival card will be in your packet. Write your arrival date, estimated time of arrival, and mode of transportation to Provincetown on the card. Please return it as soon as possible, along with your Follies and Fashion show participation cards, volunteer, luncheon and seminar choice sheets. Returning these items helps the staff know what to expect and saves you a lot of time at registration.

If you are flying Cape Air, please indicate arrival time in Provincetown so that we can try to meet you at the airport. If a volunteer is not there on your

arrival, you will have to take a cab.

Fanfair Photo Policy

Everyone is aware that the photographic and video industries earn a fortune from our fantasies. But, is that photo of you, YOU? We don't know. We do know that, with literally million of males in the U.S. and within the statistical population profile of the group attending the Fair, it is unlikely that someone seeing that picture will be able to say "By golly, that looks like good old George" (unless George points it out to them). The Ladies whose pictures you see in the various FanFair publications, all share the same concerns for privacy; they live in the real world as successful men and women. Thus, in order to protect FanFair participants, please adhere to the photo policies of the Fair;

* Participants may photograph FanFair activities for their own purposes, provided that the persons being photographed have given their consent, This is especially true for partners/spouses who are more easily identifiable.

* Sound video & movie cameras are prohibited, with the exception of video cameras operated by FanFair staff who will be identifiable.

* No person, other than a participant, employee, or agent of the Fair Administration may carry a camera or photograph activities or make sound recordings without the expressed permission of the Fair Director.

* Media must obtain expressed written permission from the Fair Director to attend any function. In addition, media must obtain written releases from any participant photographed or interviewed. This also applies to any participant who is acting as an agent or reporter for any media or proprietary publications. The Fair Director must give permission to send any photos to publications.

* The Fantasia Fair' Administration reserves the right to prohibit anyone from carrying a camera or making sound recordings of Fantasia Fair activities, but wishes to advise participants that it has no authority to control activity in public areas outside of the Fair, such as on the streets of Provincetown.

Photo & Video Release Forms

Participants will be asked to sign a Photo Video Release Form so that video recordings and photos taken by our staff may be used to present the Fair to Professional and Academic groups, Cross dressing clubs, and offered to participants who may want a nice permanent memory of the Fair. Those desiring not to be photographed will be given with A bright badge indicating "No Photographs Please!" Persons choosing to do this will be excluded from participating in public performances such as the Follies and Fashion Show.

Medical Forms

When registering at the Fair, you will be asked to fill out a simple medical form which you will seal in an envelope and return to the registration staff. It will be put in your file and opened only in case of a medical emergency where we would need to know how to contact your doctor or other designated person. The envelope will be destroyed, unopened after the Fair. You may request your envelope back when you depart on the last day of the Fair.

Louise Davy - TALK BACK

Each day, there will be an hour-long "Talk Back" in which new attendees as well as oldtimers will share experiences, strengths, hopes, and processing in a peer group setting. Discussions will vary according to the needs of the participants each day.

The goal is to support newcomers while also strengthening the ongoing experience of transgendered persons who have been to the Fair for years. Many "seasoned" fairgoers have not sat down in this kind of group in the past, so it may be a new experience for them as well. The seasoned "woman's" experiences are invaluable for the new attendee.

Conversely, the ability to talk and share feelings for the newcomer is essential. The last session of the week will process "coming down" from a full week at the Fair and we will discuss what to do when you leave, getting your ongoing network in place, and other issues the participants want to discuss.

Peer support is modeled on self-help groups, which means the discussions are in response to the daily needs of those present. This is not a therapy group but IS therapeutic for everyone who attends. There is no "therapist" for the group, but there will be a facilitator to help the group get going each day.

The Forum is free.

Dottie Laing - SIGNIFICANT OTHERS (SO'S) GET ACQUAINTED COFFEE

Meet Genetic Female Partners to get acquainted and to adjust week's events to meet the desires of the group. Lunch at the Boatshp

COFFEE CALL AT THE BOATSLIP

Recommended for all first timers (Most everyone comes anyway to see old friends and enjoy the coffee and fresh pastry).

Weslee Avery, Fair Director and Staff - ORIENTATION - GETTING TO KNOW EACH OTHER & WHO DOES WHAT

Fan Fair staff and participants are from all races, sexes, ages, professions and come from all over the world. This get acquainted program and luncheon will break the ice and start friendships that will endure long after the Fair is over, long after the last participant has gone home and the winter winds sweep over beautiful Cape Cod.

Miqqi Alicia Gilbert, Ph.D. - BURN YOUR BRA!!!

Crossdressers are famous (or notorious) for overdoing aspects of femininity that many women would rather leave behind. As a group we probably wear heels, dresses, and skirts more than any random group of genetic women. We also make sure that we are using plenty of makeup, lingerie, and padding. Why are there no flat-chested cross dressers?

This discussion will focus on 1] why we are so attached to emulating so many aspects of female ideal that are disdained or opposed by some women; and 2] what happens to us if we dress without makeup, without padding, without anything uncomfortable? Mariette Pathy Allen - MAKE YOUR SHOTS COUNT - Lunch at The Boatslip

Mariette will speak candidly about ways to improve the photos you take at the Fair. Too often your pictures are disappointing when you get back flawed pictures with too many backs, heads cut off or poor lighting. These cherished moments only come by once, you rarely get a second chance.

Weslee Avery - SPEAKER'S INTRODUCTIONS

Recommended for Veterans and Newbies alike. Meet most of the Faculty to hear about special programs. Sign up for paid programs.

Martha Rice, Ph.D., and Ari Kane, M.Ed. - DISCUSSION: ANDROGYNY

Come join an informal gathering in Ari's apartment at Hargood House to talk about androgyny, looking beyond male/female boundaries, and wondering about where we go from here.

Marilyn Volker - INTIMATE COMMUNICATION

Trickiest of all intimacies is often the emotional one. Can we talk-- both verbal and non-verbal. Marilyn Volker will offer opportunities for each participant to evaluate specific communication styles and focus on enhancing intimate (non-sexual AND sexual) styles.

Roger N. Millen, PhD. - THE ESSENCE OF T'AI CHI (Tues.-Fr. see sched.)

The T'ai Chi form consists of a set of graceful, relaxed, flowing movements that are easy to learn and do for people of all ages: strong, weak, healthy, or ill. Through regular practice of T'ai Chi, one can attain peace of mind and body by experiencing the interplay of Yin (feminine, accepting energy) and Yang (masculine, assertive energy) -- the balancing forces of the universe. T'ai Chi can be used as a moving meditation for centering, balancing, and grounding, as well as a path to one's true nature.

David Prok, M.A. -- ISSUES AND CONCERNS, PROBLEMS AND PROSPECTS OF THE GENDER AND SEXUAL MINORITIES. Dinner at the UU Meeting House Enjoy meeting, eating and discussing with local UU members at the Diversity Dinner cooked by Fan Fair members. (Volunteers accepted). After a brief "framing" by the presenters, the floor will be opened for attendees to discuss their specific concerns about the Fair, about being transgendered, and about life in general. Feedback will be obtained from other attendees and the presenters.

Come and join our resident sexologist, Marilyn Volker in examining the eight types of intimacies (only ONE is sex) and celebrate your intimate profile--or set goals in any or each of the eight! Oh, yes, sex will be discussed also--with emphasis on the four stages of sex responses-- affirming that unique responses are experienced by each participant (with/out partner(s).

Dallas Denny, M.A. - BACK TO THE FUTURE: GENDER IN THE 21ST CENTURY, PART 2 (part 1 was presented last year)

Our intrepid futurian will continue her speculations about where changing notions of gender might take us in the next millennium. Will men routinely wear skirts and earrings? Will there be a female president? Might there be a "gender backlash" which will take us back to the gender dark ages? Will the gender community become obsolete as the greater population takes to crossdressing and gender bending? Come take a trip on the gender time machine.

Niela Miller - QUALITY COMMUNICATION FOR PAIRS

Through a series of exercises, you will have the chance to try some communication techniques which may not be a part of your usual way of interacting, assess their value, and take them home to practice.


Niela Miller - THE FEMININE TOOLKIT



Roger N. Millen - HYPNOSIS: FACTS VS. FABLES - Lunch at The Boatslip

What exactly is hypnosis? What is a hypnotic experience? What are the potential benefits? Can anyone make you do things under hypnosis that you wouldn't normally do? Roger has been a practitioner and teacher of Ericksonian Hypnosis for many years and will share with us his thoughts and experiences on using altered states of attention, awareness, and consciousness as a path for personal exploration and growth.

Roger N. Millen - POSITIVE CHANGE WITH HYPNOSIS

In a safe, supportive, group environment, come and experience selfexploration using Hypnosis. Within each of us lie all the resources that we need for personal growth and movement on our developmental path as individuals. Often these resources lie hidden in the subconscious, waiting to be uncovered. During the hypnotic experience, barriers soften, doors open, and insight is often gained with respect to "next steps." Thursday, October 22

Merrill Shea - SPEECH CLASSES

Merrill Shea has twenty-five years experience as a teacher of singing and speech and as a voice therapist. Formerly staff voice therapist at the Mass. Eye & Ear Infirmary, he currently teaches privately and directs the Institute for Public Speaking at The Boston Conservatory. About ten years ago, he started working with members of the gender community. Similar to his voice therapy patients, Mr. Shea uses singing-related techniques to help his gender community clients achieve a more feminine voice.

LARGE GROUP SPEECH THERAPY SESSIONS (limited to 10)

The Introductory Large Group Speech Therapy session will be repeated twice in order to make it possible for all those who may not be able to come to the first introductory session to become acquainted with basic techniques of relaxed articulation and breathing. The workshop will focus on relating singing to speaking, as well as simple articulation exercises, to produce a more feminine sounding voice. It is a hands-on, participatory workshop and is a prerequisite for anyone planning to follow up with an individual or small group work session.

INDIVIDUAL AND SMALL GROUP VOICE LESSONS (1-3 PERSONS) Work sessions will build on the large group theory presentations.

Diane Sutton - DISCUSSION: MID-LIFE TRANSITION

The mid-life years can be a confusing and overwhelming time for a man. He is probably having thoughts and feelings he has never had before regarding career, children, spouse, parents, and himself. This discussion group will share some of the male mid-life issues and then explore the insights that crossdressing provides.

Mariette Pathy Allen - THE CHANGING FACE OF THE TRANSGENDER COMMUNITY - A slide show by the author of "Transformations". Mariette will present a documentary of the history of the TG Community over the last 20 years incorporating the evolution of Fantasia Fair and other Conventions. The change in attitudes towards the body, "passing", political activism, transgendering, as well as the emergence of the F to M and Intersex will bring you up to date.

Niela Miller - TRANSGENDER VETERANS: FREE SELF TO FREE SOCIETY -Lunch at The Landmark

An opportunity for veterans of gender exploration to take a look at where they have come, where they are now, and where they are going. What are their growing edges? What kinds of gender issues are of concern to them now? What is their connection to the larger community? What is in their minds and hearts?

Miqqi Alicia Gilbert - THE FEMINIST CROSSDRESSER - Lunch at The Gov. Bradford Inn

The feminist take on transgenderism in all its various guises varies widely from acceptance and understanding, through tolerance and puzzlement, to anger and horror. What's more, this is also true for many TG's attitudes towards feminism. We will begin by reviewing several feminist's views of transgenderism, both favorable and not. By trying to understand what is considered positive and what is considered negative we may obtain a deeper understanding of ourselves and how we are seen.

The other side of the coin is what it means for a crossdresser to be a feminist. In this part we will consider those aspects of our own lives as crossdressers that teach us something and give us insight into the role women must play. As crossdressers we often have insights into the world of the

feminine that is unique, but we do not always reflect on it or take advantage of it. By thinking about such profound things as personal safety, and sexual harassment, or such mundane things as the discomfort of high heels, or the crowding of washrooms, we can better understand the realities that genetic women face regularly. This in turn, can sensitize us to the calls of feminists for everything from pay equity to toilet equity.

Roger Millen - INTEGRATING THE MASCULINE AND FEMININE ASPECTS OF SELF

"On the one hand I want to___, but on the other hand I want to___". "One part of me needs___, but another part needs___". "Sometimes I feel___, while other times I feel___". Sound familiar? You bet it does! We all have, and experience opposing parts, inner conflict, or polarities at times.

The most pronounced example can be the tension between anima & animus, yin & yang, female & male, feminine & masculine, or anything else you would like to call them. This is an *experiential* workshop that effects a meaningful integration of these two aspects of the self. We will learn a synergistic process that can produce a new-found sense of internal balance and harmony.

Friday, October 24

Douglas Ousterhout, MD - FEMINIZATION OF THE FACE, MALE TO FEMALE TS

The presentation will be directed at describing the differences between male and female facial skeleton. It will demonstrate how the evaluations are made and then present many examples of specific changes that have been made and the overall result from feminizing procedures. these surgical procedures have become extremely valuable to the male to female transexual. The face has been feminized to a markedly improved condition with excellent results, facilitating passing.

OUSTERHOUT CLINIC

Dr. Ousterhout will meet with anyone desiring a consultation on possible facial

surgery. The clinic will be open at the Fairbanks Carriage House Friday afternoon and all day Saturday. Details will be given at the talk on Friday Morning.

Niela Miller - DREAMS AND FANTASIES

Let your subconscious and your imagination help you understand more than your rational mind alone can tell you about who you are, where you are going and how to get there. You will learn how to work with dream imagery and generate data from your image-making mind for illumination.

Sutton/Gilbert - THE EFFECTS OF CULTURE, RELIGION AND ETHNICITY ON TRANSGENDERISM - Lunch at the Gov. Bradford Inn

FanFair is a celebration, a "Splendor of Gender" which includes straight crossdressers, gay crossdressers, bisexual crossdressers, androgynes, transgenderists, pre-op transsexuals (both MTF and FTM), post-op transsexuals (both MTF and FTM), genuine women, gender-questioning people, and helping professionals. Its first weekend coincides with Women's Week, at which more than 8000 women, many of whom are serious genderbenders, are in town.

Fanfair is diverse in other ways than gender, also, having people of all races and many cultures from around the world. How can we all be sensitive to each others' needs? Attend, share and learn!

Diane Ellaborn, LICSW - CD COUPLE ISSUES AND CONFLICT RESOLUTION - Lunch at Napi's A:Discussion

Goal: Many couples do not know how to talk about issues without the issues escalating out of control or avoid issues in their attempts to keep the peace. This talk will describe different styles of conflict resolution and help participants identity the style they most often use and to develop a variety of conflict resolution skills. A model of "fighting fair" will also be described. Examples of how to apply these skills to issues that arise in couples where one partner is transgendered will be explored.

Diane Ellaborn, LICSW & Arie van der Ven, Dr. of Clinical Psychology - CD COUPLE ISSUES AND CONFLICT RESOLUTION (CONTINUED) B: Afternoon Workshop

Goal: Participants will separate into two groups. Each group will be facilitated by a workshop leader. One group will be focused on transgendered participants. The other group will be for partners. The facilitators will help participants further talk about:

- * areas of conflict in CD couples
- * what's worked in the past and what has not
- * variety of ways to resolve conflict

* new models of conflict resolution skills to these issues.

C: Group Feedback

Goal: Feedback will be shared between larger groups describing how the transgendered partner sees conflict anyhow partner sees conflict, what are the issues, and new ideas for resolution will be discussed.

Roger N. Millen - GETTING OUT OF YOUR OWN WAY: "BYE-BYE" TO LIMITING BELIEFS

Very often, limiting beliefs about ourselves, others, or the world keep us from moving toward that which we most truly desire. Unfounded fears and fantasized negative consequences of our actions often paralyze us and limit our ability to cope with the events and circumstances of ordinary day-to-day living. Participants in this workshop will learn to:

- * change fear, apprehension, or anxiety into opportunities for growth
- * reframe obstacles and disappointment into opportunities for learning
 * transform limiting beliefs into appropriate supportive beliefs

Niela Miller - THE UNDISGUISED HUMAN

Leave your fem clothes at home for this one, but bring your feeling heart and practice speaking from it in a safe and supportive group, without props. This is a powerful and freeing experience which helps you realize that your feeling life is simply an aspect of your humanity and not locked into a particular persona. Open to transsexual women as well, for "skill practice".



Your House Hostess

One of your FanFair sisters will be a volunteer for your inn, serving as a liaison between you and the innkeeper, as well as the Fair staff. 

Ms. Femininity:


Goes to the participant who best exemplifies the feminine image in comportment and deportment and most successfully expressed herself as "sister" throughout the week.




