

Daily paper profiles Renaissance & chapter

Almost four months after the initial contact and many interviews, the *Philadelphia Inquirer*, this nation's tenth largest daily newspaper, profiled the Greater Philadelphia Chapter of Renaissance.

The article, which ran on the front page of the Daily Magazine section for July 3, was the result of efforts by Ronnie Hammer, director of outreach for the Greater Philadelphia Chapter, Angela Gardner, chapter leader and Paula Sinclair, national director of outreach. Hammer contacted the paper initially to get the chapter listed in the local Neighbors section. The nature of the group intrigued one of the pa-

per's writers and the idea for the article was developed.

Inquirer writer, Kimberly J. McLarin, spent many hours talking with Hammer and other members of Renaissance. She attended the March meeting of the Philadelphia chapter with photographer in tow.

The article was very positive focusing on the supportive environment for transgendered people. Several members were quoted including Hammer, Gardner, Sinclair, Trudi Henri, national managing director, and JoAnn Roberts, national director at-large. Hammer's struggle with crossdressing issues was discussed in some detail giving

the article a very personal note.

The only negative comment about the article was made by a Renaissance member who objected to the writer's identification of speakers with the phrase, "a man who calls himself (feminine name)" None of the speakers quoted objected to this form of identification.

As a result of the newspaper article, Renaissance was contacted by *Evening Magazine*, a syndicated television news magazine. Sinclair is working with *EM* producer Kelly Ryan on a segment featuring Renaissance and its pro-active public education programs. The feature should air in the Fall season.

F-t-M's life recounted in new book

The life of Babe Bean (later Jack Bee Garland) is another amusing oddity in the history of publishing. Babe Bean donned men's clothing early in her career as a writer in order to be taken seriously. Even though she dressed as a man she made no bones about being a woman and as such was given the assignments that were befitting a female writer of her time. In 1897 female writers were doomed to such subject matter as church socials, flower shows, and other leisure activities.

Babe chose to live on a barge as the cost was less than a rented room. In the evenings, she would wander the streets looking for material to write about. Most of the material from her nightly jaunts is similar to "mens" magazines and "penny dreadfuls" of the period.

Her writing took her to unusual places one being a men's asylum. She toured the yards, dormitories, hospital, dining room, and workshop of the patients. At this time, she was the first woman to enter these all-male grounds. Unfortunately, her writings on this subject are brief and rather uninformative about the everyday workings of the asylum. After this she was off to write about the war in the Philippines. She claimed that she enlisted in the army, but no records show that she actually did. An interesting thing about this career move is that she was working for the Hearst Publishing Company and they were well known for peppering their stories with half-truths.

After her tour in the Philippines

THE QUESTION OF SURGERY

One of the more important questions (if not THE most important) any transsexual will ever ponder is whether or not to have sex reassignment surgery. For some of us with iron wills, it isn't even considered a question but an obvious eventuality answered with an "Of course!" But for others uncertain of life and themselves, the operation is indeed a ponderous question with a magnitude of consequences that would rock the Richter scale.

Focusing on the operation itself for a moment, in reality it is only sophisticated plastic surgery. Snip here, tuck there and viola. Really nothing more than what a plastic surgeon might do with a nose or breasts. (Well, maybe a little more.) But the point is that sexual reassignment surgery (SRS) is a physical cosmetic sculpting of body parts. We rationalize SRS by saying that finally our bodies will be the way nature really intended—putting the reasoning somehow on a higher plane. Agreed, the processes in SRS are more involved than in a face lift but the reality is no different. People go to a plastic surgeon to have their facial appearance match their mind's-eye image of themselves. Transsexuals do exactly the same. Wasn't it Dr. Harry Benjamin who shocked the medical establishment by saying it was easier to make the outer physical self concur with the inner self than vice versa?

The major difference between a face lift and SRS, though both are cosmetic answers to inner problems, is that one will superficially make you look better and can be changed if need be, while the other is one that 99 percent of the general public will never see and is irreversible.

A primary question in this whole issue lies in that gray dimension known as "self." How we feel about ourselves plays a big part in how

our lives unfold. An outwardly gregarious person has a lot of self esteem. They like themselves, and it shows on the outside in their appearance and attitude. Conversely, someone who has low self esteem has little outward motivation and is probably perceived by others as shy and withdrawn.

If a person's fuel for low self esteem is due to lack of confidence in their appearance, that is something that can be easily corrected by a plastic surgeon. Professional counselors, and medical doctors many times have noted the difference in a patient's attitude towards themselves and life after having a nose job or breast alteration. Often, after the surgery, they exhibit a new attitude towards life because they feel good about themselves. The removal of the problem causing physical abnormality psychologically allows the patient to function to their full capacity in society. All because their confidence and self esteem has been raised.

Usually, transsexuals suffer a debilitating psychological malfunction that affects every facet of their lives. Unhappy about their bodies and feeling like nothing can help alleviate the problem, confidence drops along with self esteem. They start into a downward spiral of despair and self pity.

In the endless search for some answer, quite often the transsexual will stumble onto some article, television show, etc. dealing with SRS. Immediately they think this is the answer, and finally a light shines at the end of the tunnel. Counseling brings the transsexual's level of self confidence up but then often mires as the therapist is hesitant to recommend the ultimate solution. The patient gets desperate, tries to take measures to sidestep the whole procedure, has surgery and finds afterwards it was the wrong thing for them to do. A nose can be fixed

again. Genitals can't. Forever really means forever.

My point is that SRS is not the nirvana many believe it to be. Surgery, in itself, doesn't solve any problems. It does lighten your purse and makes you walk funny for two or three weeks, but your problems stay after the healing is over. Just because you have the surgery doesn't mean your gender dysphoria will suddenly, magically, be swept away.

Surgery can make a difference in how you feel about yourself, however. No, it's not something you are going to put on public display for everyone to see, "Look what a good job the doctor did." It is a secret between you and your mirror. Unless body-molded pants are your gig, no one will ever be able to tell if you had surgery or not. But if SRS makes you feel better about yourself, more like the person you visualize yourself to be, then maybe it is worth it. For, as explained above, as you feel better about yourself the heightened self-confidence will show on the outside for all to see.

Some people view sex reassignment surgery as an object that gives you a new "thing"; a vagina that's like a trophy for the mantel. If you want SRS just to have a new piece of equipment then you've got it all wrong. If this is you, then you're in this for all the wrong reasons.

For any transsexual, beauty comes from within, not from without. It's got to be the spark inside you, not something a doctor tries to create. Having female/male genitalia doesn't make you a woman/man. The magic in your soul is what tells others around you who you really are. Surgery can build and construct new body parts but it can't ignite that inner flame. If you're pondering the issue of whether or not SRS is right for you, ask yourself this question: Will surgery make me look better in the mirror or will it make me look better on the inside?

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THE **NEWSQUEEN**™ *Paula Jordan Sinclair*

Here is the biggest gender story of the month: "The mystery of what makes a man a man may never be solved, but scientists now think they know what makes a male masculine." That marvelously naive sentence was how *The New York Times* lead off its report on the discovery of a gene on the human Y chromosome that scientists believe may act as a trigger to transform a growing human fetus that would otherwise become a girl into a baby boy.

Scientists have known for some time that during the seventh week of pregnancy fetuses with XY chromosomes are doped up with biochemicals that change the fetus's physical development from a female track to male. That's right, all males were at one time females - at least physically - in their mother's womb. What was missing from the body of knowledge about human development was the genetic trigger that prompted this natural sex change.

Some scientists are not certain that the gene identified by researchers in London at the MRC National Institute for Medical Research and the Imperial Cancer Research Fund is the correct gene or if it acts alone. But other scientists have hailed the possible discovery as an important clue in understanding the mystery of human development. Strangely, they say the discovery of the gene will have no impact on understanding the psychological or physical sex problems of adults because the gene only does its job once during the earliest fetal development.



From The Netherlands comes news of another medical discovery. A physician in the Dutch city of Groningen reports that a heterosexual, married patient came to him asking that his nipples be made more sensitive for sexual activity.

Following a thorough physical and psychological workup, skeptical doctors found no abnormality or

indication of transsexualism, but they started the man on a daily dose of 0.150 mg of ethinylestradiol. In less than a year, his breasts became "moderately enlarged" and the nipples highly sensitive. During treatment he lost sexual desire, but it returned after treatment was stopped. Even a year after hormone therapy ended, the man reported that nipple stimulation still produced erections and ejaculations.

The report appears in the most recent issue of the scholarly journal *Archives of Sexual Behavior*.



Another publication — hardly a scholarly journal — reports that singer Kenny Rogers is growing unwelcome breasts.

According to the supermarket tabloid *The Star*, Rogers' breast development is a result of liposuction gone awry. "About 6 to 8 percent of women get fuller breasts after liposuction," said Dr. Norman Martin, the physician who sucked fat from Rogers on one of three occasions. Martin explained that as the singer gains weight, the body deposits its fat where cells are thin, in this case the chest.

The *Star* notes that Rogers was at first embarrassed by his budding breasts, but felt better about them, reportedly, after wife Marianne said he looked quite good that way. But don't expect Rogers to outshine Dolly Parton. He is now watching his calorie intake carefully.



While we do know of Roger's initial reaction to his growing breasts, there was no reaction from another well-known male figure who was discovered in a Florida store wearing a purple tank top, a polka dot skirt, lace apron and yellow lace-trimmed panties. Ken, frequent companion to Barbie, wasn't talking, and a spokesperson for Mattel, Inc. would only say that it was just one of those things.

The doll, still packaged in its factory wrappings, was found by a 12-year-old girl browsing in a Tampa toy store.

A few weeks later, Hollywood producers Gene Kirkwood and John Hyde said they were trying to put together a deal with Warner Bros. and Mattel for a live-action Barbie-Ken movie. Hyde says that the story will be contemporary. We can see it now: relationship troubles between Ken and Barbie after Ken tells Oprah that he is a transvestite.



If Warner Bros. doesn't go for the crossdressed Ken plot, CBS might. New York actor and playwright Charles Busch, whose *Vampire Lesbians of Sodom* played off-Broadway for five years with a cast in drag, said that he has been commissioned by the television network to write a sitcom pilot.

"I had always had this fantasy of being a zany lady on TV," he said, explaining the plot for the pilot. But I sort of gave it up, thinking, 'Oh there's no way the networks will be able to separate sexuality from female impersonation.'" Someone at the network had heard of Busch's fantasy and asked him to produce a script. There were still more surprises for Busch. "I was thinking they'd want my character to be an older woman so we wouldn't have to deal with her romantic life. But Jeff Sagansky, the head of programming, said to me, 'Gee, I thought she'd have a sort of Mae West quality.'"

Busch admits that the project can be derailed at any point after he produces the pilot script that CBS has contracted for, so don't program your VCRs just yet.



If CBS picks up Busch's option, he will join other television crossdressers like Terry Sweeney who regularly impersonated Nancy Reagan on "Saturday Night Live."

Public accommodations just aren't what they used to be. Consider this story from Houston. Denise Wells and another woman were fined \$200 for using the men's room at a concert because the line to use the women's rest room was unbearably long. Now, the famous "bathroom question" that once graced these pages, has become the hottest topic for discussion on Houston call-in radio shows. Most everyone, male and female, is on her side.

Wells says she will fight the fine in court. So far more than 60 women have called her attorney willing to testify that they, too, have been

compelled to relieve themselves in facilities intended for men. So far, no men have called with similar experiences.



Some accommodations remain separate, like prisons. From California comes news about the only person known to have served time in a Golden State correctional facility as both a man and as a woman.

Elisabeth Kingsley, 35, recently appeared in San Diego Superior Court to work out a plan to repay the people whom she defrauded following her sex change. She had pleaded guilty to several fraud counts that involved bilking people out of nearly \$20,000. Her attorney said that many of the victims were Kingsley's "live-in lovers," and an exact accounting of the money owed could not be determined because they commingled their finances.

Kingsley, who as Robert Villa served time in prison on a grand theft conviction years ago, said she was innocent of the 1988 fraud

charges, but that she had been pressured into accepting a plea bargain. She was ordered to repay \$9,996.



Kingsley is lucky that she was only prosecuted on state charges. If she had used a device advertised in a recent *Soldier of Fortune* magazine, she could have faced federal wire fraud charges.

The ad in the magazine for wannabe mercenaries touts a West German device that uses digital technology "that lets you change the pitch, tone and timbre of your voice. Men can become women; women can become men!" And it only costs \$275.

Our thanks to Rhonda Smith of Sharon, Mass., for bringing this to our attention. Our copy of *SOF* was lost in the mail; we garroted the postman so it never happens again.

Transsexual in prison takes TS support groups to task

From my own personal experience I can say that transsexual organizations and so-called transsexual "support" groups on the streets are not at all concerned about their transsexual sisters in prison, lip service aside. It appears these "support" groups aren't supporting anyone but themselves, their egos and their treasuries. They are theatrical drag queens, as opposed to being down-to-earth women.

While these support groups are holding gala conventions, luncheons dinners and fund raisers at extravagant plazas, events you must pay to attend, traveling in airplanes, a transsexual sister may be lying naked on a cold concrete floor in a strip cell of some prison's psychiatric wing without a blanket, because, in a flash of desperation at repeatedly being denied female hormone treatment, she became suicidal. Or she may be lying in a prison hospital with a stitched scrotum after trying to castrate herself. While the support groups are stuffing themselves at their banquets in celebration of their "achievements," a transsexual sister in prison is stuffing herself with fat-rich, junk food in order to be overweight so that she may maintain some semblance of breasts. That's how the minds of some people work; desperate people. But for the support groups, the world of transgender is all a tossed salad.

There is much literature on the market put out by "support" groups. None, however, offer anything of significance to transsexual prisoners who are the minority in the transsexual community and the most poor. I doubt if the treasuries of the "support" groups would suffer a dent if they made some basic literature and assistance available free to transsexual prisoners. For example, literature having to do with female hormones, literature of and towards medical litigation (hormone treatment in our case), AIDS informational literature and assistance in obtaining hormone therapy in prison or litigation towards that objective. These transsexual organizations must acknowledge to themselves and in their literature that there are transsexuals in prison, that we are undergoing more degrading treatment than any caste of inmates because of our transgender orientation, and that we need your help. Then they should "come together" and develop a program for the purpose of addressing the reality of the transsexual in prison; those of us who want and need help that otherwise is unavailable. Many of us are determined enough but lack resources, information and support. This can lead to much frustration, strip cells and hospital beds.

I wag an accusing finger at all of you theatrical drag queens who

think transsexualism is all about wearing dresses and high heels and having a party. Transsexualism is a deeply serious matter. I would advise you not to call yourselves a "support" group of the transsexual community unless you are in fact going to support the transsexual community and not your own selfish individual interests. We, who have-not, know the pain of being a woman. We know the oppression of being put down and denied, the depression of being ignored. We know the taste of the death wish. The power that has made us what we are is the witness. We speak truth and our voices will remain no matter how many veils you wear or how loud the music; no matter how many crumbs you let fall from your banquet tables.

I know well of what I speak. I am the woman who slept on that concrete floor and lay in that hospital bed. I am the one who has written to "support" groups and received their well-printed propaganda. I am the one who asked them for help and never heard from them again. You, who claim yourselves women, out there in the free world would learn well from your sisters in prison. We are accountable, yes, but so are you.

Ms. Contreras is one angry woman. I cannot think of a more hopeless position for a transsexual person to be in. She is being denied support not only from within the prison system but also from outside. No wonder she is angry.

Some will read her letter and think she deserves her plight otherwise she wouldn't be in prison to begin with. But we who are not transsexual have no idea to what levels of desperation she might have succumbed nor what crime she

committed to reach her goal of sex reassignment.

It is relatively easy when you are white and moderately educated to get through transition, but a minority sister has a different path to travel. There is a good reason why many TV and TS prostitutes on the streets are minorities; they don't have the education nor the access to the information, resources and opportunities we do. Many of them dropped out of high school because they could no longer stand to be

beaten up day after day because the other kids thought them "fags."

There is much that could be done to save these sisters from a life on the streets and in prison, but that's a subject for another article. For now, let me say that Renaissance has a Prison Project in place. We have been sending our newsletter and other information for free to those who ask for it. The Prison Project costs us money. 

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Toronto SOS helps TVs & TSs get off streets

Toronto, Ontario is often touted as a progressive city; one with a bright future. Like any large city, it has its dark side: drugs, robbery and prostitution. Now, a social service agency, Street Outreach Services (SOS), is trying to alleviate part of the prostitution problem.

SOS works with young men and women who have chosen a career of prostitution. A large number of the young men they encounter are transvestites or transsexuals. SOS tries to educate these people about the medical, legal and social implications of their chosen lifestyle in the hope that the young person will voluntarily choose to leave it.

The program conducted by SOS works in three phases. The first phase is streetwork. Four streetworkers in teams of two cover the major downtown area prostitution "tracks." They work Monday to Saturday until 1:00 am. Their goal is to make contact and establish a rapport with the prostitutes.

The second phase is drop-in support. SOS maintains an office in the area where street youth may stop by, day or night. A wide range of resources are made available on a voluntary basis. These range from informal conversation, to counselling, to AIDS information, and even to a needle exchange program operated by the city.

The third phase is called High-Support, a comprehensive program of counselling and support for finding education, training programs, new jobs and housing. For those in High-Support, there is a co-op boarding house available. It is not a group home and has no treatment facilities. It is simply a safe place to stay.

SOS has formed a peer support group for their TV/TS clients called "Transsexuals, Lovers, Friends and Family." They are asking for literature, input or advice from transgen-

AAAS policy was ahead of the times

The June-July issue of *Rainbow*, the newsletter of the Rainbow Gender Association (San Jose, Calif.) carried this resolution from the American Association for the Advancement of Science (AAAS).

"WHEREAS some American Scientists are members of sexual minorities (Homosexuals, Transvestites, Transsexuals, etc.) and

"WHEREAS these persons may be valued members of their professions capable of making great contributions to the progress of science and to the National Welfare, and

"WHEREAS there still exist many forms of discrimination against these scientists because of their sexual orientation without regard to their professional qualifications and

"WHEREAS such discrimination constitutes a loss to science and an injustice to these individuals

"THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the American Association for the Advancement of Science deplors any form of discrimination on the basis of sexual behavior between consenting adults in private, and

"BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that the Board of Directors be directed to charge its Committee on Opportunities in Science to take due cognizance of this resolution in its work."

This profound resolution was passed by AAAS in March 1975 and is an excellent model for other organizations to adopt as a policy against discrimination on the basis of sexual behavior.

Female To Male (Alyson Publications, \$8.95) falls short of really telling much about the life of Babe Bean. The author, Louis Sullivan, has relied heavily on newspaper accounts of the life of Babe Bean and this source for facts is very questionable. *Female To Male* is a rather fragmented look at a person's life and leaves many questions unanswered about the real life of Babe Bean.
