History of The California Cuties

The year 1970 marks the 22nd season on tour for the California Cuties, and in that time, the West Coast funny men have risen from a group of unknowns, to one of the world's top sports attractions. In late May of 1961, the United States Army selected the Cuties to make a September tour through the Pacific to entertain American troops. This was the culmination of many years of playing against the top softball teams in the nation while putting on a long series of side-splitting shows. The troops in Japan, Korea, Okinawa, Phillipines and Taiwan saw first hand the fabulous Cuties. Of course, many things have happened in the past over these last 22 years which have carried the Cuties to every corner of the United States and Canada and to foreign lands also. The competition has always been tough, but nonetheless, the California nine has been able to compile an amazing record. The team's best winning season was 1955 when 109 victories went into the record book. The same season the Cuties lost 16 more than any other campaign. But there is more to the history of this fabulous team than just the records. The beginning, for example, when a World War II act started this whole crazy touring whirl.

Trino Palacios, who you will recognize as Larr Jane on the Cutie roster, was in the United States Air Force back in the 40's. An occasion arose where some entertainment was needed. Somehow, Trino got into the act and decided on ball players dressed in ladies garments. This Palacios decided might be good for a howl at least. Trino of course had no idea what the impact of this first show would have. In any event, the Army buddies thought the show was terrific. It was presented again, and again. Then came the end of World War II. Palacios wanted to leave most of his memories behind and return home to his family. But once back on the West Coast in Compton, California, Trino would not and could not get the "lady softball players" off his mind. So it was decided to pick up some top-rate softball players and go on tour. Actually, it was 1948 before the first tour was given a try. The initial game was played in the city of Lynwood, California. About 500 fans showed up but the show was a huge success. So the Cuties were asked to come back the next week. To the amazement of the game promoters 1800 jammed the park and over 500 had to be turned away. In the years that have past since the first game, attendance has been varied, once going as high as

14,000 in a single night. Of the beginning, Trino Palacios (Liza Jane) has this to say: "I had quite a time getting enough players to wear female attire, but after a lot of talking convinced nine ball players that they should be part of the show. After I got the ball players to agree, it took some time to get a chance to book games because our show was a long way from the usual softball game. But I finally set the game in Lynwood, Cal. and the merry chase was on."

Over the years of touring, the Harlem Globetrotters have had their moments. And the Cuties, who are sometimes called the Globetrotters of softball, have had their moments too, some good the others, well, not so good. The Cuties many times have been into cities where big promo-

tions have been in force. But the promoters on some occasions did not have a complete knowledge of things and a small crowd showed up. Like the stop the team made in a Wisconsin city several years ago. The Cuties travelled 455 miles to get to the game. Then they languished as 55 fans paid in to see the attraction. Of course, there is the other extreme. Back in 1954, the Cuties were in McKeesport, Pa. to take part in a 4th of July celebration and 14,000 fans were on hand. That show went over with such a bang that the Cuties were asked to appear on a popular night club in the evening. On another occasion, the Cuties had an open date while in the Western part of Canada. Driving into the city of Lethbridge, the team booked a game and played for the benefit of Pony League baseball players. The local radio station plugged the game all day. At night, over 1000 fans crowded the ball park to get a look at the California Cuties.

In the early days of touring, the Cuties were thankful to get going in a vehicle of any vintage, in any shape. Many thousands of miles have been covered by these laughmakers. Like many persons in show business, the Cuties from time to time have had heartbreaks and bad luck. But never has the ills of a player or the group interfered with the main object of the Cuties: To Make People Laugh and play good softball.

The Cuties, like the average tourist, must always be prepared for any happening on the highway. In the thousands of miles the team has traveled since 1948, there have been the usual flats, running out of gas, etc. But the veterans

with the organization always look back to 1954 and a break down to end all breakdowns. It happened on a tour through Western Canada. What happened read like a box score; rear axle busted, two tires exploded, the generator went dead. The vehicle was about to succumb itself. With the destination of the game 60 miles away, there was only one thing left, hitchhike, and the Cuties did just that. The game was played. The car has never been heard from since. While touring and covering the many highways of the United States and Canada, there are always the brushes with oncoming traffic, or a driver stopping dead in front of you. The Cuties have had their share of this, like the time a sleeping driver came down the highway, crossed the island and chased the Cuties into the woods almost to get out of the way. And then there was the time the team was on a bus going through a pass in California. On the downhill part of the pass, the brakes on the bus failed. The bus careened down the hill, the Cuties speechless at what was happening. Luckily, the driver was able to guide the bus off the highway and into a bank of sand. Everyone was a bit shaken but exceptionally happy. Of course on another occasion, a station wagon ran out of gas at the top of a hill that was seemingly miles long. So down the grade they went, rolling, rolling and rolling until, by some miracle, a gas station. Twenty feet more and the Cuties would have made the lead pump.

The classic happening was when the Cutie bus ran low on water and one of the members of the troupe put the water where the oil goes and all it did was cost us a new engine.

The season of 1970 will add a year to the California Cuties' history. The schedule in '70 will carry the 8 men to the Eastern seaboard, thence across the entire country, plus a tour of Canada, before returning to the West. When it is all over, the Cuties will have traveled over 30,000 miles, pushing the team's all-time total of miles on tour up over the 800,000 mark. Trino Palacios, the founder, hopes the Cuties can continue for a long time, at least until the mileage chart shows a million miles logged while visiting cities and towns to put on shows. Tonight, the Cuties are proud to be your guests. They hope to return again, as they write and make The California Cutie History.




PETE HALOWATIVK














LOTTA FANNY ...


