the IFGE board meeting, we formed two new committees: The Y o u t h Information Committee, chaired by Dr. Sheila Kirk; and the Technology Committee, chaired by Jamie Fenton.

Sheila Kirk's committee, with the help of Dr. Sandra Cole, will develop a program for TG youth that children can access on the Internet so that they and/or their parents can surf the net and find out that they are not unique and alone, but special and part of a beautiful community.

Dr. Kirk is the IFGE's resident medical expert and has been lecturing, writing, and giving information to the TG and professional communities for nearly a decade. She is in the process of doing the following research:

- •Teenage Cross dressing
- •Post operative M2F female survey
- •The Androderm testosterone skin patch study for the F2Ms
- A study of breast disease, both benign and malignant, in the transgender male taking estrogen
- •A study of prostate disease benign and malignant in the transgender male taking estrogen
- A study of the transmission of TG spirit and behavior in families, siblings, and parent/child relationships
- •A study of people of color in the transgender community And now we are giving

Dr. Kirk even more to do as chair of this new committee providing information for children over the Internet.

Jamie's committee will help us develop the technology to put this program and all IFGE programs and research on the Internet. And IFGE (supported by your membership and contributions) is the prime mover behind all this research. Powerful and exciting, isn't it?

What did IFGE do this year? You know about the Partner's in Diversity

Award. This award is just the beginning. Michelle Martin is our chair of the Partners in Corporate Diversity Committee and she and her committee will be out there looking for other companies to impact and add total diversity acceptance to their employment policies. In fact, definitions are changing every day to accommodate diversity. This year, Aetna Life and Casualty changed the definition on their homeowner's and automobile policies to read "domestic partners refers to two adults, of the same or opposite sex, engaged in a spouselike relationship characterized by mutual caring and dependency."

This year, we also opened in Waltham the first public bookstore de-

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NOTES FROM THE CHAIR

For many years now, whenever TV/TS Tapestry Journal came back from the printer, Yvonne would send me a case (60 magazines). I always sold whatever I could, which usually totaled 20-25 copies of each issue.

When the new and improved issue #74, renamed *Transgender Tapestry* came out, my sales jumped into the mid-thirties. I was excited about the 30% jump in sales.

Back at the office, sales are measured in returns. Many distributors will take large quantities of the latest issue, and then return any unsold previous issue. We never would know what was sold until months after distribution. (Unsold magazines are given away to helping professionals at events like the American Psychiatric Association or the Social Workers conventions.)

As *Transgender Tapestry* #75 is now hitting the bookshelves, we are witnessing a very small return rate. In fact at one time we only had thirty copies left in the office to sell.

I am now informed, orders for #75 have exceeded the number of copies we normally print by over 300. Subscriptions have also jumped to an all - time high. Obviously this is great news. If this keeps up, we will have to consider bumping up the printing on #76.

Since Vanessa Murray has been in charge of the bookstore (Jan.'96), book sales have also jumped through the roof. She sold \$4500 worth at the IFGE Convention alone! Way to go girl! And a special thanks to those of you who helped her stock the shelves to begin with.

Certainly the income from these two sources helps keep the IFGE doors open. But realize that a huge amount of important information is also reaching those in need. This means the primary purpose of IFGE to distribute educational materials is being met.

Our last board meeting brought

discussion on whether we should stay in the convention business, especially since we lost money in '95. What a difference a year makes. This year everything went right. We made money, attendance was up, and everyone was pleased with the entire program.

I especially enjoyed the awards night on Saturday. It was very entertaining for the first time in ten years, and many of the awards were very emotional. Particularly, what Mr. Baker, a vice-president with American Airlines said after Michelle Martin thanked him for the corporation's support for transgendered individuals. And said something like, "It's a real shame when someone has to come into my office to thank me for treating them like a human being."

Signs indicate the Convention in 1997, will be the best ever. The California groups who are cosponsoring the first ever combined gender event with us are very excited, and so is the IFGE Board. This will also be Alison's first chance to show us some of her real talents in running conventions. Stay tuned for more IFGE/California Pride 1996 news.

I'd love to tell you what Alison's up to, but truthfully, this lady is hard to keep up with. If I get to speak with her every ten days or so, I'm doing great. And when I do, she speaks so fast about so many good things, I hardly get a word in. She's been bouncing around the country for the past year now, trying to meet with everyone possible, in hopes of increasing unity in the gender community.

I want to thank the many groups and individuals who have made Alison's work possible by donating Frequent Flier miles and other forms of transportation. I also want to thank those of you who so graciously opened their homes to give her a warm place to stay and a bite to eat. Your generosity, whatever it may be, is always welcome and needed.



1996 IFGE Board of Directors Election Results & Appointments

The right to vote for IFGE Directors is a privilege of IFGE membership. Two hundred eighty-eight ballots were returned, which represents a solid portion of the membership. Linda Buten, current Chair, Naomi Owen, Holly Cross, and Laura Caldwell were all returned to the board for three-year terms. Melissa Foster, Winnie Brandt, and Kristin James were selected as first and second alternates and will be appointed to fill any vacancies created by resigning board members. Nancy Nangeroni, whose name was mistakenly included on the ballot, will remain to serve for one more year, and will stand for reelection this year, if she so chooses.

How May We Help You?

Every day, the phones in the offices of IFGE in Waltham, Massachusetts ring dozens of times, and are answered with the greeting, "IFGE, how may we help you?"

Many of the calls are routine: book orders, subscription questions, address changes, and requests for general information. Others are more serious: TG people, professionals, and community leaders in search of important information. In most cases, we can fulfill the caller's needs relatively easily, but they are not all that simple.

On the average day there are always a few calls from people in a crisis situation: "My wife just discovered that I'm a cross dresser." "My boss found out that I used to be a woman." "I think my twelve-year-old child is a transsexual!" "I cannot go on living this way any longer." . . .

We do our best to help, often by referring the caller to gender-sensitive professionals, or to local support groups. But listen we must; care we must; and this takes a much greater amount of time than most people realize

Recently, when addressing one local TG group, I ended with, "You've heard from me; now I want to hear from you. What can the IFGE do to help you

in your mission of serving the TG community?" After a lively discussion, a few members of the audience lingered to continue discussing specific interests. The very last person who had patiently waited for the others to finish, finally approached. I said, "Now, what can I do for you." To my astonishment she replied, "You're doing it. You are willing to listen. So many leaders have been unwilling to listen to us who have to do the work at the local level."

Wow! If this is true, it is a sad commentary on the leadership of our community. How can we learn what is needed if we do not listen? How will we know what we, the leaders and organizations can do to help those who have needs and issues relating to their gender expression, if we do not listen?

So my message is two fold. First, if you are part of the leadership at any level-local support group, or a national educational, service or outreach organization-take heed. Our constituents want our ear and we must be willing to listen. Then we must show some response. This is the price, and a good one, that we must pay to be effective and responsive as leaders and as organizations.

Secondly, please know that at the IFGE, the question "How may we help you?" applies to all our constituents-but especially to each and every member of IFGE in a special way. You have contributed your money and your interest in what we are doing. Please tell us your needs, your issues, and what you think we can and should be doing, for you and for others. We care and are here to help. Let us know how.

The main IFGE/California Unity site will be the Queen Mary's exclusive three-deck convention center. Evening activities will be held in the art deco charm of the First Class ballrooms, dining rooms and lounges. Day-time programs will include the key personalities of the TG community and helping professionals. Speakers, enter-

tainment, and award ceremonies promise to exceed anything IFGE has had in the past.

Rooms start at \$65.00 for roomettes and go up to \$280.00 for the bedroom/parlor Royal Suites. Registration information should be out in July. Of course the April weather in Southern California is most delightful.

IFGE/Minneapolis Pride Convention Huge Success!

The 1996 IFGE National Convention In Minneapolis, Minnesota will be covered in full color in the summer issue of *Transgender Tapestry*. Attendance was a total of 181 paid registrants, plus 25 staff and volunteers making a total of 206 people who came and participated.

The convention more than broke even with a gross margin (because we do not charge Waltham operations overhead) of about \$4,000.00. This provides enough seed money to get the 1997 convention underway. The sum involved represents not only the success of the convention but also donations from caring individuals, including a grant from American Express which helped underwrite IFGE's financial risk in the initial phases.

The Winslow Street Fund received donations of over \$1,500.00, while bookstore sales were about \$4,500.00 - an all time high.

The comments we received after the event told the story. "The convention was a major turning point in my life." "I never experienced such positive energy and love." "The programs were fine and the banquet was great." "In one word: Wow!" "Great! Looking forward to next year!" And many, many more.

If you weren't there this year, won't you please try to join us next year in Long Beach, California?

And if you have never been "out" before - whether a CD, TS, TG, F2M or M2F - then by all means plan to attend. You will never encounter a friendlier, more supportive atmosphere in which to explore and express your inner self.

IFGE Board of Directors Annual Meeting

The IFGE Board of Directors meets four times each year, usually concurrent with a major transgender community event. The Annual Meeting took place at the Minnesota Pride Convention on March 29, 1996, in Minneapolis, Minnesota. Every aspect of IFGE's function and activity is reviewed and planned by this seventeen-member body.

Chairperson Linda Buten opened the meeting. Seventeen members were present. The meeting dealt initially with the reappointments of officers and committee heads. Committee chairpersons then made their reports.

Laura Caldwell, Chair of the Budget/Finance Committee, reviewed various considerations on the income and expense prospects for the coming year and felt strongly that IFGE might see a small gain in its income/expense margin—something not realized for several years.

One area of great importance is the creation of a subcommittee within the Nominations Committee. Michelle Martin is in charge of this new committee and will spend the balance of the year evaluating companies for the next Diversity Award, to be offered in 1997 at the IFGE Dreamin' Convention in California. Michelle was instrumental in creating this award and in its first presentation to administrative officers of American Airlines at this year's convention in Minneapolis. Nearly twenty of the company's officers were present to accept the award.

Reports from various committees were numerous and important to IFGE's growth and to the

energetic outreach it gives to the community. The Winslow Street Fund, chaired by Abby Saypen; the Membership and Fund Raising Committee, chaired by Sharon Saypen; and Medical Liaison, chaired by Sheila Kirk all had important information for this board meeting, and the work of these committees will be vital and ongoing as this year continues.

The IFGE Board is progressive and alert to the needs of the community as the staff of IFGE works to serve and satisfy the community. The Board of Directors welcomes input and exchange with you. Address your comments and suggestions to:

voted to the TG community. It's a wonderful facility, on the first floor of our headquarters, where people from the community and the public will find much food for thought.


This year we published a quarterly newsletter to keep all our members informed about what's happening and to reach out to all the local groups around the country.

Sharon Saypen

Chair, IFGE Membership and Fund Raising

Sharon Saypen is Chair of both IFGE's Membership and Fund Raising Committees. She says serving on both is "a privilege." In response to a request for information Sharon wrote this about her background and involvement with the IFGE:

"It is not very often in life that one is given the opportunity to truly put their beliefs about themselves to the test. As a young girl growing up in a strict orthodox home, I found freedom in reading.

"Every book I read from Arthurian romances like Tristan & Isolde to Joan of Arc to Ann Frank gave me inspiration that there was more to life than just going about your business; that life had more meaning than to just live for yourself; that helping others and standing up for the rights and freedom of others gives life its essence, its immortality.

"As a young woman, I looked for a modern role model - and I found a remarkable one - Eleanor Roosevelt. Though like us all she had her flaws, she put her life to the test many times and in dangerous places to support the freedom and well-being of others. I would fantasize about being in battle at the Warsaw Ghetto uprising or the war for Israeli independence in 1948. But it was easy to fantasize; reality is a much harsher test.

"I was in college in the 1960s. I had my first exposure to protesting and standing up for something I believed in. I joined my fellow students in protesting the Vietnam War and was pushed around by police. So I learned there was a price. Still, a little pushing around with a large group of people is no great accomplishment. Then, like everyone else, I moved into a life of marriage, children, family, friends, doing some charity work here and

there, and teaching English.

"But I believed I was the defender of equality, civil rights, gay rights. It was easy to mouth the words and not have to be put to the test - I really did not have black friends or gay friends or transgender friends.

"Then I went back to school for my doctorate and studied under a brilliant woman who became my mentor. She pushed my borders and gave me inspiration. I spent many hours at her home with her, fellow students,

and her partner discussing philosophy, spirituality, language theory. She was gay and was the most extraordinary and brilliant woman I had ever met. She had great humanity for all of us even though she had suffered much in her life.

"Why am I telling you all this? Because all these were safe tests of my belief system.

"Then it happened - I didn't know when I met Abby that he was the one who would not only share love with me, but give me the opportunity to extend the love and respect for myself by being able to follow through on my beliefs about diversity, dignity, freedom of self-expression, and about accepting a human being for the beauty they have

inside. When Abby and I are in public and people look at us and occasionally laugh, I hold Abby's hand more proudly because I am living what I believe and we are extending the possibilities for other people.

"And that's why I became active in IFGE. I saw the possibility to stand up for what I believe in, help others lessen their suffering, make a difference, enrich my life, and surround myself with beautiful people".

"When Abby introduced me to the community a few years ago, I saw a community in conflict, full of fear with a terrible need to be legitimate but also filled with wonderful people. I had an instant new family and everyone I have met has added to the richness of my life. I also thought about how sad at all the suffering and fear in the community; but how uplifting is the joy when you allow yourselves to be who you are. And so I found a home for my battle, a battlefield to be a warrior for diversity. But to fight the battle together, we have to have a vision for the future, and we have to live our present from this future and not live the present from the past.

"It appeared to me that IFGE was an organization worthy of my energy, time, money and commitment. Here was a charity trying desperately to provide outreach to people in need; here was a young charity struggling with the community to find a clear identity in helping that community establish credibility. And here was a community that could help change the world.

"I can't do it alone, you can't do it alone, but we can do it together as a united front. To quote a proverb from Hillel, a great Jewish philosopher, 'If I am not for myself, who will be; if I am only for myself, who am I?"
