#### MEMBERSHIP RECORDS - Winnie

The format of the computer file containing the TGIC membership records that were transferred from Jennifer to me required certain changes to make it compatible with my word processor. In my system, the records are now kept in a table of eight columns, and can be automatically sorted in alpha-numerical order by any selected column. This is useful, for example, in printing mailing labels where those that require special handling (e.g. foreign postage or dues notice insertion) can be brought to one end of the list, which should reduce the chaos of our envelope-stuffing parties. The eight columns are:

- (1) Mailing name
- (2) Address
- (3) ZIP code
- (4) Membership category (2-letter code)
- (5) Date for dues renewal (year/month)
- (6) Phone number and calling caveats
- (7) Code number for member directory
- (8) Social name, if different from mailing

Information not given to us by members is omitted. The *TGIC MEMBERSHIP OUTREACH DIRECTORY*, which is being sent with this newsletter to current members, is an abbreviated example of the table. It was prepared by first sorting the general table by column (7), placing those members who want to be included in the directory at the bottom. This section was then copied to another file and sorted by ZIP code, so that members living close together will appear nearby in the list. Columns (4), (5) and (7) were then deleted, together with individual addresses or phone numbers that remain confidential.

Columns (4) and (5) are printed at the top right of the mailing labels. The two-letter codes are selected so that alphabetical sorting of (4) will bring the membership categories into an order that will simplify certain record-keeping and mailing tasks. The codes are:

FG foreign general member

- KK key club member with closet
- KO key club with attic storage
- MA member with special mailing request
- MC member couple
- MG general member
- ML life member
- SS sample subscriber
- SN subscriber to TGIC News
- ST subscriber to The Transgenderist

Some time ago, Jennifer began noting the month when dues were paid, and recording the next anniversary as the date for renewal. For prospective new members (those now in the SS category, previously SMP) she recorded the date when the first free sample newsletter was mailed. However, difficulty in searching through the mailing list for dates led to considerable variation in the number of "grace period" issues sent before dropping a name from the list.

We will continue the same method of recording dates, but in year/month order so that sorting by column (5) will bring delinquents to the top of the list. When dues are paid, the date will be incremented by one year, so re-sorting will return them to near the bottom. We will also allow a four-month grace period. For the last issue, \*LAST\* will be printed on the mailing label in place of the date. Then, if dues are not paid before the next mailing, the member or prospect will be dropped. For those who may be short of cash at the time, we can offer a 6-month extension for \$20. <u>NOTE</u>: For KEY CLUB members, the date indicates the month through which their rent has been paid.

Quite often, mail sent to addresses recently changed by members or furnished by new enquirers is returned to the Club by the Post Office, stamped "Addressee Unknown". If this happens, we will first assume that it is an error by a P.O. sorter who does not recognize that the name you have given belongs to that address. We will insert "c/o" before the address, so the P.O. should deliver our next mailing anyway, and change the first letter of the category code to R to alert you. If you see this on your label, you should complain to your P.O. If you told the P.O. to return our mail, please tell us, too, so we won't waste any more postage.

All of you, please check your mailing label and directory entry (if you are in it) for accuracy. I have updated and verified the Club records as far as possible, up to February 4, but there may be some errors due to poor handwriting or transcription from phone messages.

### TRANSSEXUAL PROBLEMS - Theodora K.

Eleanor (a pseudonym) was 17 and had severe problems. She left no note and made no call for help. She read two textbooks, college level ones, about toxic gases. She attempted to leave "Planet Earth". Luckily, the gas only confined her to bed for a week with chemically induced pneumonia. She was very healthy.

Nobody found out she did this. Her parents had no inkling.

At an older age, she demolished a car, by driving it at roughly 80 mph into a metal gate and into a multi-ton boulder. She was arrested and, surprisingly, talked her way out of a night in a psychiatric ward.

I met her a few years ago, while a student at SUNYA, in a Calculus course. She's white, has a higher than average IQ, drives and talks circuitously. I asked her how she'd gotten stitches so conveniently over her radial artery. (She gave a big grin....)

She had accidentally cut herself.

Eleanor is still alive. She is also a good reason to have "outreach" and information for those transsexuals who have serious problems.

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## S. P. I. C. E. The Most Important Crossgendered Community Conference of the 90's - July 8-11, 1992

Hi, I'm Carole, a crossgendered single male in my 30's. You may know me from my article series "Out of Carole's Closet" in *Gender EUPHORIA* (the Boulton & Park newsletter), or a piece called "Challenges of Living as a Crossgendered Heterosexual Single" in a recent *Femme Mirror* (Tri-Ess national magazine). The title of the latter, pretty much describes my current place in life. Hopefully, the crossgendered part is permanent (this is pretty much a given, although I wouldn't change it), and the single, isn't.

You may have heard about the upcoming S.P.I.C.E conference within our community. It's not a convention to: bolster sales of a "Sears store brand perfume", new line of lingerie, or even those leaves and funny colored potions you throw in to make those last minute food preparations palatable. S.P.I.C.E. stands for Spouses/Partners (female) International Conference for Education.

S.P.I.C.E. is the first national convention dedicated to our spouses/partners and <u>not</u> primarily focused on those of us who are transgendered. For those of us who are transgendered and in a long-term relationship, our spouses/partners are very significant aspects of our lives and important to us. S.P.I.C.E. provides the opportunity for our spouses/partners to "work the issues through" and come to a better understanding of a relationship with a transgendered person. Even for those of us who are not in a long-term relationship, but someday hope to be, S.P.I.C.E. provides the assurance that support for your spouse or partner will be available to help your lives together to be richer and fuller, recognizing the positive contribution of your nature to the relationship. *[Gender EUPHORIA, November 1992, Vol VI, No 11, page 19]* 

My personal view is that this event is the most significant milestone for the community for the decade. (Not to undervalue a host of important other community conferences.) To me it makes numerous statements.

The first is that we are NOT a bunch of perverts off in a closet; that our community is composed, in most cases, of wholesome individuals involved in relationships. (Not that you need to be in a relationship to be wholesome.) Our people would be considered "normal" in society, and in many cases, above average, other than for lack of societal acceptance of being cross or trans-gendered.

Secondly, it provides hope for people like me who are unattached, that enough understanding will develop in our society that this won't be a permanent condition. Like any understanding, it needs to develop one person at a time. Also, unless we as a group, can view the implications from the other side, view the issues from our spouses/partners perspective (in more than their shoes), how can we hope to create, sustain or strengthen such relationships?

As this is the first such conference, where generating momentum is a major undertaking, I view it as a top priority for our community to rally behind and support. This is especially important now, in it's conception phase. We can't afford to let it wait for five or ten conferences to succeed. Our community needs to get totally behind it immediately, especially within the current "moral majority" environment.

As all new things, there are those who doubt the success or importance of this conference, perhaps because they cannot see how it relates to them. I would like to try to dispel some of this rhetoric.

#### "Why would I let, or even encourage, my partner to ever attend S.P.I.C.E.?"

Your spouse or significant other deals with the transgendered issue 365 days a year like you (366 on leap year). Remember, all that guilt you had early on, it certainly was a burden for me. Finally you have gotten over it, or at least feel more comfortable being out with others like yourself (otherwise you wouldn't have come across this message) and started to deal with it in a constructive manner. Well, your partner didn't have to deal with it and had a choice, other than for yourself (the common link). Imagine for a moment their feelings. If you are like me, you still don't understand it completely and have moments of doubt... You and I have dealt with it our entire lives. Your partner hasn't! Their conscious or unconscious thoughts might include: "What will other people think of me that I promote, tolerate or even know about such behavior and stay in a relationship?" or, "I love them so much, why can't they get over it?".

I took a job in sales once selling a product which I was not confident in. As you guessed, it just didn't work out. Are you a confident enough salesperson to sell your partner that it is worth it, or that it is not as gray as it seems? Can you provide the understanding of people such as Cynthia **Cynthia** and Linda **Cynthia** have been happily married for thirty five years, they've counseled and helped hundreds of crossdressers, dedicating their lives to our community. Can you match the understanding reached in a discussion group with partners and professionals from all over the country, who can isolate your outside problems from those of gender dysphoria?

#### "No cross-dressing, besides it costs ninety five dollars."

"But they're not going to allow cross dressing at S.P.I.C.E.," is commonly heard when people talk about it, mostly the crossgendered males. To start with, it is a spouses/female partners conference. Do you realize how fortunate you are that you have a spouse who tolerates this to any degree, and that you have a chance of developing an understanding? I bet you know at least one personal story about a broken relationship which ended due principally due to cross dressing.

Also, times are difficult monetarily for many, however, if you look at the itinerary and cost compared to any other convention, you can see the motive is not profit.

If the transgendered person accepts the female image, and it goes deeper then a "sexual perversion", how can they deny their spouse some time to attend a conference for a weekend, even if they can't dress. Think of it as a chance to focus on the issues for all of us. It is just one weekend! If you're like most, your spouse/partner didn't know it when they got into the relationship. How about letting the other side have a little time? Are you worried they will talk her out of letting you cross-dress? Not likely. Just think how valuable it was for you to attend your first support group meeting, or receive literature from the community and share thoughts when you first came out. For me to get rid of the isolation was nothing but euphoric. Where does your partner have to go to talk about it? In many cases she is clearly instructed not to tell a soul. Which may be out of practically (financial security, protect the children and family, avoid embarrassment and harassment etc.). Just think what one weekend might do for your significant other to spend it "out of the closet". There are no guarantees, but she might not feel so isolated, or she might make a friend who has something in common.

"I could buy another dress or some more makeup, or a third pair of those shoes with the money."

In terms of financial resources at the last "T-Party", I observed over half of the outfits (at least for the formal events) cost more than the registration fee for S.P.I.C.E. Do you think it is too much to spend less than the price for one outfit to help your relationship?

#### "But I am single, why does the S.P.I.C.E. conference affect me?"

As a single crossgendered heterosexual male, it means that maybe someday efforts like S.P.I.C.E. will generate enough understanding in our society so you (and I) will meet someone who accepts it, or when the time comes, aid in bringing someone special to understanding. Also, you can help your peers, who are lucky enough to be in relationships, exhibiting the truly feminine quality of viewing yourself as a piece of something larger.

#### "You signed me up (I can only hope), what can I do?"

Get your spouse to attend. I hope I have persuaded some of you to allow or even encourage your spouse to attend. Maybe you can watch over the kids that weekend, to give your spouse a break. Hopefully the weekend will inspire your spouse to become more accepting, and bring you both closer together because you did something for her. (Who knows, she might even bring you home a nighty!)

Pass the word around the community, let's all rally behind this event. Why not develop a contingency in your support group to attend, perhaps traveling together (to reduce expenses), throw a fund raiser or a raffle with a registration fee as a prize, with proceeds to S.P.I.C.E? As for myself any donations to the "Texas T-Party" tag sale (beyond the 25% going to the Boulton & Park outreach fund); I am donating to the S.P.I.C.E. conference. Why not consider doing something similar.
