In addition to those new faces, we had a different kind of first timer. Cindi, a young lady from the Dayton area, told her husband that she was going out with a friend, but instead came to our meeting. We're used to husbands sneaking out to the meetings, not wives. We do applaud her wanting to know more about crossdressing after learning that a friend of hers was a crossdresser. She seemed to regard the experience as a positive one.

- 3. Cross-Port has been looking for a GCGLC representative and Susan Lovelace has graciously volunteered to be that representative. Belinda has also volunteered to be our alternate to that spot. This is very important to us as GCGLC rules state that if a group misses three meetings in a row, they have to reapply for membership, even if they have paid their dues. Cross-Port has missed the January and February meetings.
- 4. The decision was made to contact IXE and the Crystal Club to set up a "meeting of the minds" concerning the possible joint venture of a regional newsletter. Things to be discussed are format, expense and workload sharing, and monthly publication schedule. No date has yet been set.
- 5. The idea of a second meeting each month, on a weekend at a hotel or motel was discussed. Everyone was in favor of giving it a try for two or three months. We had originally planned to go with Claudia as she spends her winters in Florida (oh wicked, wicked life), but she had a surprise visitor from Cincinnati and was forced to skip that meeting. Donna, a friend from Tampa we met at the last Be All, was also forced to miss the meeting due to illness, so we found ourselves not knowing anyone when we arrived. That did not last long! Those Florida gals were quite outgoing and made us feel right at home.

They meet in a motel suite which had a living room area, a kitchen and two bedrooms. Newsworthy

A near-flung correspondent writes:

Let me share with you some news, bits of information and a few thoughts. First off, as we all know, a crossdresser's hair is probably our most significant attribute, and the best wig shop I have come across would have to be Jade Fashions at 112 W. 6th St. in downtown Cincinnati owned and operated by one Son Jahn. I first met Son when I was searching for a supply of millinery pieces for work. After a couple of conversations at her store we got on the subject of crossdressing. She said she services many local FI performers and of course other male clientele. (The first time I walked in there was a guy braiding a long red wig into pig-tails: "I'm going to be Pippy Longstockings for Halloween!)

Son is not only very open and happy to help, she is understanding of us, sophisticated and open-minded in her thinking, a pleasure to deal with and lest we forget - she dresses well. Also, at the risk of sounding the ugly-Midwesterner, her English is good; which, frankly, has been a problem at other wig shops. Son has mirrors at the back of the store and one is free to use the restroom if preferred. She also has a decent selection of jewelry (including clip earrings), hats and other accessories. It's just west of Race St. and please tell her you're from CrossPort.

Now then, heading north up Vine St. into the Over-the-Rhine area one can visit the sight of several shootings of crossdressers. The incidents took place Sunday evening, Feb. 3. One transvestite prostitute was shot and killed outside her home, another was shot twice and survived, a third woman was shot at but missed. The second two did not live in the area but apparently were doing business in the 1600 block of Vine.

The media attention has been minimal (as is the usual case when something of this nature happens in Cincinnati's own Hell's Kitchen) and the only reason I noticed was that Channel 9 blurted a sensationalistic teaser for their news featuring rare footage of the wild transvestite prostitute that was wounded. The newspaper coverage in the Post was completely non-existent and the Enquirer tied it in with an article about the St. Paul Halfway House closing its doors in the neighborhood. This article did not mention that the wounded or the dead were crossdressers or prostitutes. As of this writing no suspect has been arrested and no motive was given.

Crossdressing in film and television always seems to have its niche, usually as simple comic relief whether in quick cameos as in a recent Murphy Brown giving a three second take and a two word line for a quick gag, through the talk show milieu which, not to

seem ungrateful, I still view as probable comic relief and up to an entire sitcom series (Bosom Buddies) which dropped the gimmick after it used up its quotient of drag gags.

Finally, the crossdresser as legitimate character was brought to us by who else, David Lynch in Twin Peaks. The character appeared in several recent episodes and plays a Federal Drug Enforcement Agent, "the best" as FBI agent Cooper says in prelude to Dennis' entrance. Cooper is unaware of the drug agent's new fashion statement and his eyebrows raise along with the rest of the townsfolk when "Denise" enters. But by the end of the evening, everyone is quite nonchalant about her. The treatment throughout the episodes was similarly accepting and Denise was depicted as professional, up front and gracious. No sophomoric jibes were written at this character but a few moments of humor did evolve that were genuine and fresh and non-disparaging.

But the real kicker to Denise's character was that it became transvestite as hero(ine); wherein she saves Cooper's skin twice. Once by using the old gun in the garter trick to extract him as a hostage and a second time by clearing his name of phony drug charges. It was nice to see not only a dramatic portrayal of a crossdresser but an extremely favorable one as well. I thought, maybe it will get the Hollywood folks to give up the idea that the only good transvestite is a funny transvestite.

And so they have. The Silence of the Lambs, a new film based on Thomas Harris' bestseller suitably opens on Valentine's Day. Of course I haven't yet seen the movie but I did read the novel when it came out on an acquaintance's rave recommendation. A serial killer is murdering women and skinning them. An FBI female cadet finds herself on the investigation team and by befriending an incarcerated serial killer who happens to be a genius is able to eventually track down the killer dubbed "Buffalo Bill" by the press.

This time the crossdresser is on the other side of the law, he is the serial killer and from the dead women he is fashioning a "girl suit" for himself. In the novel, Buffalo Bill is a distraught homosexual who thinks he is a transsexual but is unable to convince the needed psychiatrists of this in order to attain hormones, surgery, etc. So he takes matters into his own hands. Harris' use of a gay man who cannot gain the approval of the medical profession acts as meager disclaimer for posing a transsexual in a despicable light. I don't think Harris was intentionally sniping at sexual minorities and I don't know how the film will handle it (though I can make a pretty good guess) but

I do know that millions of people will see this movie and see a negative impression of crossdressing, simply - a crossdresser as villain.

Transsexual Issues: Employment

There are many obstacles that a transsexual must overcome in order to make a successful transition. One of the hardest in terms of society is that of finding employment.

Most states do not make it easy for a pre-operative TS to find or hold a job since most do not offer any kind of protection from discrimination under the law. They also make it next to impossible to obtain a valid ID with one's chosen gender reflected. These things, added to the fact that a TS's own inner confidence can be at it's lowest point because of the many personal rejections encountered during the change over, can make it difficult to find a job in the chosen gender.

I wish there was a magic formula that I could site that would help in all cases but such simply does not exist. There are however a number of steps which I believe can be taken to improve one's chances of success. I am drawing from my own experience in describing these things.

To begin with, once you decide to begin full time living, don't be afraid tell your present employer. Many TS's have been able to make successful changes while maintaining there jobs. However, be prepared for the rejection. Don't take it as a personal criticism of your work or your ability to perform that work. Many times the decision to let the TS go is based on a fear of how the change will affect the ability of others to work with the TS or how it might affect the over all climate in the work place.

Also don't jump the gun at telling them. If you work in a position which requires very little skill and any one could do your job, the chances of finding another such job may be less.

Make a plan. Begin by getting your name changed legally and changing the name on your Social Security card. They won't change your record to reflect your new gender but they can leave it blank in the computer.

If you graduated from high school or went to college write to them and enclose a copy of the court

order. They will change your record to reflect your new name. Also send a letter and copies of the name change order to any old employer that you intend to use as a reference. Almost all companies will honor them and most companies will not give the reason why you left.

If your state will not issue valid ID's, then on the day you get your name changed, have a friend go with you to the place where you get your drivers license. If possible go to one of the smaller, out of the way places. Have them dress rather professionally and go through the line with you. When it is your turn let them go forward and while handing them your court order say, "Miss (so-and-so) wishes to get a new driver's license which reflects her new name and gender." Let the license bureau take it from there. Many times they will simply make the changes. If they say they can change the name but not the gender don't argue with them. The next time you get it renewed the chances are they may think they made a mistake and change it for you.

If you don't have a salable skill enroll in a school for training. There are plenty of short term trade schools which will make you more marketable and at the same time provide you with the interaction of others as a woman.

Begin to interview for jobs even if you don't think that you have all the skills required. You need the experience of the interview as a woman as much as you need to find a job. Besides, many companies are looking more at how much you can learn to do versus what you know how to do. They usually want you to learn to do it their way.

Dress appropriately for the interview. Don't try to be a trend setter your first time out. Also don't allow the fear of rejection to stop you from going to an interview. If you are like most of us, the same fears existed when you interviewed as a person of the old gender. Remember that your most important need in the beginning is experience.

Don't be ashamed to take a low paying job. If you are a good worker you can work your way up in time. Besides, in the beginning you may get fired if they find out about you, and the less you make the less of a loss you incur. Remember too, that the loss of one job is the opportunity to seek a better job.

As a person who once earned \$50,000 in one year as a combined income, I was not too high and mighty to take a job that paid \$3.75 an hour. I only worked there 2 months before they decided to get rid of me

but I learned more about working as a woman than any school could have taught me and I got paid for it. I believe it prepared me for my current job which pays more and is in line with my skills.

Finally, don't offer any information about yourself. You are a woman and that is that. You have nothing to lose and everything to gain. If you do tell them, they may not hire you. If you don't tell them and you do get hired and then they fire you because they found out you are no worse off and a lot better off. You did get some experience.

The bottom line is that while it may be a little more difficult to get a job as a pre-operative transsexual the same rules apply in employment. A company will hire you if they feel that they will be better off with you on board. It is your job to convince them that they would be better off.

The more confident you appear as a woman with something to offer them, the less likely they are to question who or what you are even if they suspect it.

Lastly, if you get hired, be prepared to work twice as hard as before and give twice as much, not just because you are a transsexual but because you are a woman.

Influences

Social psychologists now have hard evidence for what many working women already know: If you want to wield influence in a man's world, you have to play dumb.

A new study has found that men are much more likely to have their minds changed by women who speak in a tentative, self deprecating manner than by women who know what they're talking about.

The same study also found that while men are threatened by assertive women, other women prefer them. Women, in fact, are more likely to be swayed by women who speak directly than by those who start their sentences by saying "I really don't know much about this but..."

"It's kind of sad, isn't it?" says Linda L. Carli, assistant professor of psychology at the College of Holy Cross in Worchester, Mass., who conducted the study. "In some contexts, women are damned if they do and damned if they don't. If you're trying to reach

an audience of both men and women, you're really in trouble."

Another implication of the study is that it doesn't help a woman to have men perceive her as competent. Both the men and women in the study perceived assertive women as being more competent than their tentative sisters, but the men were still more likely to change their opinions after talking to women they perceived as more hesitant -- and less competent.

The research, which involved 229 psychology students, was published in the *Journal of Personality* and Social Psychology.

"The men in my study described the women who were hesitant as less competent and knowledgeable," Carli said, "But they also described them as more trustworthy and they liked them more. So for men it appears that it's more important that a woman be accessible and likable than competent in order to be influenced by them."

Taking previous research into account, Carli speculates that men are less comfortable with assertive women simply because assertive women threaten their status in society. White males still hold 97% of the senior management positions in the United States.

Carli believes this kind of behavior is unconscious: Most women aren't aware that they are talking in a more tentative way to hold a man's attention, and most men aren't aware that they prefer this approach.

Researchers believe the same patterns hold true for anyone in "low status" positions, including blacks and ethnic minorities. Like women, blacks who are more subtle in their approach may be more persuasive than their more assertive brethren, Carli speculates.
