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AIDS Benefit Is Boffo !!!

There were those who thought that the idea of an AIDS benefit was laudable but ill-conceived. And there were those who offered more positive wisdom - we would be lucky to break even. But we fooled 'em all! With barely two and a half months of preparation, Renaissance members proved, once again, that we can deliver what we promise. The Travelling Trash & Talent Tuesday AIDS benefit was successful by any measure.

Of course, there is good news

and bad news. The bad news is: ticket sales were not up to expectations and there is no money to donate to AMFAR. The good news is: the show returned a profit and Renaissance is making a donation to a local AIDS charity. Renaissance board members will present, in person, a check for \$500 to WE THE PEOPLE WITH AIDS & ARC in Philadelphia.

Renaissance has shown itself to be a responsible member of the metropolitan Philadelphia community. It has achieved no small measure of recognition through this event. Write-ups, prior to the show, appeared in the Philadelphia Inquirer (the major daily paper in the city), the Philadelphia Gay News, and Au Courrant, as well as showing up in event listings in other city dailies. The show itself was provided coverage by PGN and Au Courrant, who sent a photographer.

If you missed the show, too bad! You'll just have to wait until we do

it again next year.

Have Dress Will Travel...adventures in Columbus, OH.

Last month three Renaissance members took to the road and carried the organization's message to Ohio. Angela Gardner, Trudi Henry and Paula Sinclair spoke to two human sexuality classes at Denison University on Sept. 21. The following day, Angela and Paula appeared on the television program "Good Morning, Columbus."

The Denison students had been briefed about crossdressing by Professor David Przybyla, so there were only a few sideways glances as the Renaissance girls took their seats at the front of the classroom.

Each gave a brief autobiography with heavy emphasis on their crossdressing experiences. The remainder of the period was devoted to questions from students. Although they were a little nervous at first, the students soon entered into a productive dialogue with Angela, Trudi and Paula. The students even laughed at their jokes. The girls also managed to slip in some flirting (Angela with the female students, Paula with the males).

The questions ranged from inquiring about feminist issues to the old chestnut of "which bathroom do your use?" and "what do you put in your bra?"

Dr. Przybyla said the visit resulted in a new positive attitude among his students regarding sexual variations. This, he added, was "quite an accomplishment." He termed the entire visit "amazing," and promised to endorse these Reanissance sessions to his colleagues at other colleges and universities.

Tuesday's television show went well, Angela and Paula said, even though they were dubious at the beginning. The show on Monday was devoted to AIDS and some of the guests quoted Lyndon La-Rouche and other right wing extremists. While watching that program, Paula became concerned that a city with people like that may not be open to the alternative lifestyle of crossdressing. When Angela and Paula arrived at the station the next morning, there were additional "bad omens." The other guests included a group of single people there to discuss the heterosexual dating scene in Columbus and a skin care expert.

But the girls were pleased by the open-mindedness everyone displayed. Calvin Sneed, one of two co-hosts, said before the show that he had a friend in San Francisco who is a crossdresser. That put Angela and Paula at ease. The interview went so well that toward the end of the segment Sneed even asked the two "B" questions: bathrooms and bras. Two telephone callers implied criticism of crossdressing, but the girls were able to deflect it with humor.

After the show, Sneed, co-host Dawn Meadows and their producer talked to them for over a half an hour about crossdressing. They were invited to do the show again.

Most of the Buckeyes the girls encountered on the trip were polite. For example, on Monday night Angela and Paula went shopping at a nearby mall (dressed in their men's clothes). When the sales clerk learned that they were buying women's clothes for themselves, she was very friendly and helpful. The same was true of the staff at the motel where the girls stayed. Because they got back from the station late in the morning, they needed an extension of the check-out time. Paula went up to the desk clerk-dressed-and asked to keep the room for an additional hour. "No problem," the desk clerk said, as if they had crossdressers stay there every day!

All in all the Cha-Cha 3 evening was very enjoyable and very memorable. Obviously, a lot of thought and planning went into this event. However, the most important ingredient was the PEOPLE, who came from all lfe styles and occupations.

Crossdressing In The Heartland ... by Trudi Henry

Late in September, three of us Renaissance girls made an appearance at Denison University in Granville, Ohio to speak to two sections of Dr. David Przybyla's Human Sexuality class.

There's something about a campus in the heartland in Fall that takes me back to a time when living was easy and I wasn't in debt. It was also a confusing time of trying to get a handle on what I was about. I just wish that someone would have done for me what Dr. Dave (as his class calls him) is doing for his kids.

When I was an undergrad, I took a course in Human Sexuality in hopes of learning more about why I felt some of the things I felt, particularly that nagging little matter of wanting to dress up like a girl.

The class was one of the most popular at the university. It took a couple of quarters of trying just to get into the section. Finally, I got in and was all set to learn the answers to all my questions.

I bought the text and just couldn't wait. I popped open the index and found the page covering "Transvestism". The subject, along with homosexuality and transexualism, was covered in a chapter on sexual abnormalities. It also included every fetish and kink I'd ever heard of and a few I hadn't. I don't remember the exact wording, but in a sentence or two it simply said that transvestites were men who dressed like women. I muttered, "Thanks for the in-depth analysis." I hoped for more when the semester started.

The class itself was no better. We spent days on fantasies and masturbation, but breezed through the "abnormalities". The net effect was that I felt more like a freak than ever.

Dr. Dave takes a refreshingly different approach. He uses a text-book that spends a number of pages on crossdressing. In inviting us to speak, he let us show his students that we can pursue our feminine side, and yet live a full life otherwise. He made available, on a private basis, the names and addresses of TV support organizations in Ohio.

I can't help but wonder, though, if there was just one kid in either class who was like me when I was studying Human Sexuality. If so, I hope we gave him/her some encouragement and made him/her feel a little less alone. I hope we spared someone the endless cycle of guilt, obsession and alienation.

Living In A Box ...by JoAnn Roberts

The newspaper carried a story today of an 11 year old boy who was kept in a wooden box by his stepgrandmother, because she feared he was brain damaged. The boy was found to be mentally normal.

When I read the story in the October 10th issue of the Philadelphia Inquirer, I almost started to cry. What an ignominious way to live! How has that poor child's pysche been damaged? What will happen to him in later life? The whole thing gave me pause to consider my life.

As I thought about that child, I realised that I, too, at one time, lived in a box. My box was made from a variety of woods; bigotry, racism, sexism and parochialism were a few. The nails holding it all together were fear, loathing, ignorance and despair. The wood was supplied, without charge, by the world around me and I pounded those self-made nails. Yes, my box was nailed shut from the inside. I hid the real me in that box for

almost 32 years. The person that walked through the world was only a facade, a shadow-person built out of other people's expectations.

Then one day something happened. The nails made of ignorance started to rust away. They were soon followed by those of fear. Eventually, the nails were all gone and first one side then the other fell away from my box. I let free the real me. I faced the world for the first time and realised that I could be my own person. I could have original thoughts and feelings. I was not a puppet to be controlled.

I knew I could do almost anything I set my mind to and that ultimately, I could control my life. The key was acceptance of myself and acceptance of the responsibility for my actions. I understood that there is a basic human dignity within everyone and that dignity deserves respect. I resolved never to apologize to anyone for being me. And, I would consider carefully any criticism of others.

So, how many of you are still living in your own boxes? Isn't it about time for you to start pulling the nails free? Isn't is about time for you to kick the boards loose? And, isn't it about time for you to face the world and yourself with the truth?

There are no barriers except those you erect yourself, so tear them down. Look in the mirror and say to yourself, "I have the ultimate control and responsibility for my life." Then believe it and get on with the rest of your life. The past is immutable, so why worry over what cannot be changed? Look forward to the future and new goals. You will be amazed at how much you can accomplish if you will only believe in yourself.

There is no one in this world more deserving of your respect than yourself. For, if you cannot respect yourself, how can you possibly respect anyone else? And, how will you ever break out of your box before you mentally suffocate?
