Disney dispute leads to law suit

A very important legal battle is shaping up on the West coast. A crossdressed person was ejected from Disneyland after being discovered in the ladies bathroom. She carried a letter from her therapist explaining her need to dress in public, but officials paid no attention and denied her membership privileges. She plans to sue Disneyland and has support from Drs. Paul Walker and Richard Green. Dr. Walker is former head of the Harry Benjamin Association, and Dr. Green is co-author of "Transsexualism & Sex Reassignment" with John Money.

ETVC has started a defense fund to help our sister defray her legal costs, estimated at about \$5000. As we feel a special kinship with our sisters at ETVC, and since this is an opportunity to show our unity as a para-culture, it would be great if Renaissance members could help out with a donation of any size. Further details are sketchy at this time, but it is hoped that one of the principals will fill them in for the next issue.

Multi-exposures for Renaissance

In the broadcasting industry, November is known as a "sweeps" month. And now that term applies to Renaissance too, for last month Renaissance members appeared on broadcast or cable television programs shown across the nation on four consecutive week days. In addition, Renaissance and TransPitt in Pittsburgh cooperated on television another show in the Steel City that was broadcast over parts of three states.

Renaissance Director of Outreach and Public Affairs, Paula Jordan Sinclair, said that television producers are looking to boost their viewers in November because that is one of the months when audience ratings are calculated. "This", she said, "explains TV's great interest in TVs."

The crossdressing sweep began with Paula's return to The Morton Downey Jr. Show as one of six "allstar" guests. These were the

guests who during the past year had generated the most calls and letters from viewers. Because this show was even more of a circus than the Downey program usually is, Paula did not represent Renaissance on the air. The program was aired twice last month. A week before the program was taped, Paula and Angela Gardner did Renaissance represent Downey's first anniversary party held in Lower Manhattan where they chatted with celebrities and broadcasting executives, and were photographed by a German television crew.

A few days later, five Renaissance girls, Michelle Douglas, Teri Kay, Berré Lyndon, Angela and Paula taped a Donahue show on crossdressing fashions. Donna Miller and Eric Lee went with the girls to Rockefeller Center and helped with hair and makeup.

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Professionalism and credibility winning public acceptance

Renaissance is making great strides in the areas of public awareness and acceptance for transgendered people. This fact was brought home recently while dealing with several large, well known organizations.

First case in point: the cartoon that was printed on the front page of last month's newsletter. A lot of other newsletter editors just copied it without asking for permission from the legal owner. Why? Probably for two reasons. First, "everyone" assumed the legal owner would turn them down. Second, they might be too embarrassed to tell the legal owner where it will be used. Yet a simple, straight forward letter to the cartoon editor on Renaissance letterhead, a sample of the front page and a phone call to follow it up was sufficient to receive this reply from PLAYBOY, "We are pleased to grant a one-time, nonexclusive, license in the English language to The Renaissance Education Association, Inc. to reprint the cartoon within your newsletter entitled Renaissance News."

Next case in point: the phone company. In the past several months Renaissance has been the subject of two extensive newspaper articles and a feature article in *Philadelphia Magazine*. The Board felt it was time to get listed with Directory Assistance. When the phone company was contacted

The Phoenix Society ... a report on South Africa by Thelma

If the proliferation of clubs and societies catering for the needs and interests of transgenderists throughout the world is any indication, crossdressing, in all its aspects, is on the increase. Or, is it the fact that acceptance of the transvestite and the transsexual is gradually becoming more widespread with the growth of desktop publishing and greater ease of communication, among other factors. Is the world at large becoming more informed and many of the countless crossdressers starting to become visible and emerge from the loneliness of their closets?

This would appear to be the case in the experience of the Phoenix Society here in South Africa, which was founded six years ago by our President, Marlene. Through her dedication and, in the beginning, single handed efforts, it has grown from a handful of members, survived the hazards of infancy, and is flourishing with an active south African membership in excess of eighty and a significant number of overseas members in Britain, N. America, Australia, and Malta.

Eighty may not sound like a large number compared with some of the TV groups in the USA and in Europe, but it should be remembered that South Africa is a large country, geographically, with a small and widespread population comprised, to a great extent, of a macho oriented and somewhat Calvinistic society. Even so, we are well aware that Phoenix represents but the tip of the transvestic iceberg.

Phoenix is a self-help support group and welcomes persons involved with all levels of transgenderism. A short while ago our first female-to-male transsexual, soon to undergo reassignment, became a member of the Society. Perhaps we are strangely fortunate in not having club premises of our own and have avoided, to any great extent, the pitfall of contempt and intolerance between transvestite transsexual, extrovert crossdresser and closet queen, that I could not help but be conscious of when I lived in Britain. Meetings and social events do take place from time-to-time in the main centers, Cape Town, Durban, and Johannesburg, most often in the home of of one member or another. These gatherings rarely consist of more than a dozen people, to a large extent because of the distances and time involved.

Education has always been of prime importance to the Phoenix Society, not only of its members, but the public in general as well, in the belief that the better we know ourselves—the better we are able to understand our condition and cope with the world at large. Thanks largely to the efforts of Marlene, and more recently Joy, Phoenix has enjoyed a great deal of favorable publicity in the way of feature articles in some mass circulation family magazines and national newspapers. A great triumph, in light of the fact that transvestism and transsexuality were almost unmentionable subjects in the media, a few years ago.

One sad disappointment was when the S.A. Broadcasting Corporation produced a sixteen minute television feature on Joy, our membership secretary and one of our transsexual members, who has had the courage to live her life as a full-time female, and in doing so went through a great deal of trauma and lost her job for eighteen months. The film was scheduled to be screened in the Sunday evening peak hour program "50/50" and was canceled by the "powers that be" at the last moment.

The present major project at

hand is the publication of a book, written and compiled by Marlene and Joy, titled "The Transgender Phenomena". It will endeavor to explain all aspects of transgenderism in the hope of bringing some degree of knowledge and understanding to the public at large. It is intended to distribute this volume free of charge to medical doctors, judges and magistrates, editors and 'agony aunt columnists, psychiatrists and psychologists, educators, etc. throughout the country. We find that ignorance of the subject outside our own community, even on the part of the medical fraternity and those in authority, to be alarming. We hope that this project will do a little to help alleviate the situation.

I sincerely believe that we, the transgenderists of the world, are, to borrow Phaedra Kelly's phrase, "a Nation Within Nations" and as such, are able to rise above national boundaries, prejudice and politics. As you see, the Phoenix Society is alive and well, flourishing and trying to do its share to benefit and bring about understanding on behalf of all transgenderists, whoever and wherever they may be.

What is it about transvestites and female impersonators that is so popular? The newspapers are simply full of articles about men who want to get in on the act...

The big story is about television's first transvestite character, Bunny/Bonnie on the soap opera "Santa Barbara." Bunny, a newcomer to the show, is a reformed gangster. According to the plot line, Bunny once had to don woman's clothes in order to avoid a mob hit. When he arrives in Santa Barbara he discovers that he really has a fondness for drag (who can blame him?) Early last month, Bonnie made "her" first appearance. There is no indication from the show's producers as to how the writers will ultimately develop the transvestite twist. But one of those supermarket tabloids says that Bunny will be sent to a shrink.

Joe Marinelli says that at first it was "weird" playing a woman, but "now its wonderful." Off camera, the reaction of other cast members varies greatly. "Women on the set treat me like I am in a wax museum. They come up and feel my clothes. The men just laugh."

Marinelli says that Bonnie "is wild with flowing red hair. She's a tease, but she's always a lady."

And here's good news if "Some Like It Hot" is you favorite film: MGM/UA has recently released it on video.

Maybe someday they will make a movie about Michael Grubs, the 1989 Rice University homecoming queen. However, Grubs has relinquished his crown last month in Houston. The 19-year-old student abdicated in favor of Nancy Jones who was his first runner-up according to student votes cast earlier fall.

Grubs made his reluctant decision because, he says, the rules for the Cotton Bowl Parade (in which the Rice queen is scheduled to appear) discriminate against male queens. Instead, he will serve as Jones' escort.

Here's an important note: The election of Grubs by the Rice students as their homecoming queen says more about their opinion of homecoming than it does about their notions about gender roles. Previously, the students elected a dog and a refrigerator as homecoming queens.

But then, you never can tell. Sometimes support comes from the strangest places, like the Weekly World News, another of those supermarket tabloids that wrings every ounce of shock value from reports about transvestism and transsexualism. A couple of months ago, the editors made a big deal about the Atlantic City transvestite who had opened her home to an infant with AIDS.

We were frankly surprised by a recent letter to the editor and its response from the *WWN* staff. The

letter was surprising, as all letters to the editor of that publication are, because we didn't know most readers could write. As could be expected, the author of the missive criticized the child welfare agency forgiving "a degenerate like that a poor defenseless baby to raise." Crossdressing, the Texas letter writer said, "is a sin against God, and anybody who would place a defenseless kid in a perverted home like that should be fired—and then shot."

The editors replied that "at least this 'degenerate' had the decency to open his heart and home to a kid with the world's most terrifying disease. Would you?"

And speaking of breast implants (look, some items just can't be linked; so sue me), a panel of advisors to the Food and Drug Administration last month did not ban silicone breast implants, at least not immediately. But the panel did vote to collect additional data over the next two months, data that one witness told the panel was being kept from the public pending the outcome of a malpractice suit.

The panel examined the results of one experiment conducted by Dow Corning, the leading maker of silicone-filled implants. blobs of the silicone gel were injected under the skin of 200 rats. Between one fifth and one quarter of the rats, depending on the rat's age and the type of gel used, developed cancer that was fatal to most of the rats. Even though the implants used in humans consist of a bag filled with the silicone gel, small quantities of the gel sometimes leak from the bags and migrate throughout the body.

The panel also heard from women who described the suffering they had endured as a result of

Also on the show were three female impersonators from Los Angeles who specialize in high glamour drag-Dahlia, Melody and Tiffany. The cast was completed by three Big Apple crossdressers, Mistress Antoinette of Versatile Fashions (Box 1051, Tustin, CA 92681), and several of her associates. In addition to the more than a dozen crossdressing models, the show also featured the transformation of a male model and Phil in modified drag (a skirt and blouse paired with male penny loafers and a cardigan sweater).

Two Renaissance members—Teri and Robin Dormer—and two friends of Renaissance—Coco and Amanda Winters—appeared on "People Are Talking" from WWOR in New York. They were on a regular segment of the program called "Girl Talk" where co-host Renee Hambley asked them about the process of looking like women. The program is carried by many cable television systems across the nation.

Renaissance Managing Director, JoAnn Roberts, her daughter Anna, and Paula rounded out the sweeps month with an appearance on "Pittsburgh's Talking," hosted by Ann Devlin, formerly of Channel 10 in Philadelphia. The show also featured a telephone interview with the wife of a transvestite that was arranged through Sheila Kirk, President of TransPitt.

Video tapes of all of these shows, and the many others that members have appeared on, will soon be available in the group's library.

February is the next sweeps month for television, and plans are being made to reach out to other markets, Paula said. She added that there are plans for a return appearance on A.M. Philadelphia.

Living the fantasy at Fantasia Fair

You would think after attending Fantasia Fair three times, it would begin to lose some of the trill, glamour and joy that I experienced the first the first time; such is not the case. It seems, each time, better than the last. This may be due, in part, to the Fair becoming better every year, or it may be that I am learning how to pace myself to get the most out of it. In any case, FanFair is one FANTASTIC event.

The fair could be described in detail with the hundred or so scheduled events over the ten day period (it begins on a Friday and concludes the the Sunday of the following weekend). There are breakfasts, luncheons, banquets, cocktail and pajama parties, a fashion show, a follies, and a costume ball. You can attend special church meetings, a church supper, and regular church services. You can join the gang for a "Whale Watch" (I saw a dozen!) or "Go Fly A Kite" on the beach. There are seminars and classes on every aspect of the CD/TV/TS/TG scenes, from makeup and speech to lifestyles and surgery. Each year these are new and different. The program is extensive, diverse and exciting. Betty Ann Lind of the Outreach Institute and her staff are to be commended.

There is yet another piece to this picture that makes the fair so wonderful and that is the Provincetown environment. Besides being a quiet Portuguese fishing village and artist colony (with a significant overlay of tourist gift shops, restaurants, and lodging), this town has developed a culture of caring, sharing and acceptance, so that people from all walks of life feel welcome and comfortable. As one person put it, "P'town is a place where closets are for hanging clothes and not to live in."

To me, P'town is friendly innkeepers, bartenders, shop clerks, waiters, and a church filled with hugging where it is hard to sit through a service with dry eyes. P'town opens it's heart and it's arms to those who are suffering (PWAs) and who are oppressed by social discrimination (gay, lesbian, TV, TS, TG). You may get an occasional snicker from the high school brats that hang out by the Town Hall, and once in awhile a tourist will do a double take at the six foot tall blonde in four inch heels and a Shirley Temple pinafore. Generally, however, we can dress pretty much as we please. I cannot believe it but I've taken to wearing jeans, sweaters and docksiders for daytime and full glitz for the night. At the parties, of course, you can go as wild as you like.

If you want the ultimate combination of freedom to be all you want to be, yet feel safe (and welcome), give P'town a try. They're taking reservations for next year now and I've already registered.

(Editors Note: The Fantasia Fair, held each October in Provincetown, is in its fifeteenth year. It was started by the Human Achievement and Outreach Institute as a means for people to experience their feminine sides in an educational and social setting. Fantasia Fair holds a special place in Alison's heart; it's where she was 'born'. Alison has attended the '86, '87 & '88 Fantasia Fair and the '87 and '88 Tiffany Spring Outing in Provincetown and was awarded Ms. Congeniality this year. they were extremely helpful with getting the listing on the system as quickly as possible, within 48 hours. They had no problem with the subject matter, although it was necessary to verify the non-profit status.

Final case in point: the United Way. Nestled between the white and yellow pages of the phone book are some blue pages that list local public organizations and government services. The phone company has the United Way handle these listings for them. Renaissance contacted the Philadelphia United Way to see about a listing. The woman who handled the call was familiar with Renaissance via the listing in the Philadelphia Inquirer and it will now be listed in the white, yellow and blue pages, as each section comes up for revision. In addition, the United Way provided information on how to become listed with them as a donor

option organization. That means a contribution could be made to Renaissance through the United Way via a payroll deduction program at work! Once again, verification of non-profit status was required.

One might expect such large, mainstream organizations to take exception to an organization for "perverts and weirdos." Such has not been the case. Each of these steps is a small one in itself, but, taken as a whole, it shows a level of credibility and acceptance that some in this community would believe impossible. And, indeed, would have been impossible without the proper groundwork laid out one step at a time.

Renaissance is working for you, building a reputation that is solid and well respected in the Delaware Valley. More steps will be taken, one at a time, and more doors will be opened. Fiat Lux!

Implants have been in use for 25 years. More than 2 million women, and an unknown number of men, have received them. New implant surgery is performed at the rate of 130,000 per year.
