# WHAT'S PLAYING AT THE MOVIES

There's a new "drag to riches" movie making the rounds. It's called *Too Outrageous* and stars Canadian-born impersonator Craig Russell and Hollis McLaran. The film was showing last month at the Roxy Screening Room on Sansom Street.

You may recall that Russell starred with McClaran in another movie a few years back titled *Outrageous*, which got fairly good reviews if only for his impersonations. Russell, who does a wild Betty Midler among his impressions, played a gay hairdresser who befriends a very schizophrenic, pregnant young woman (McLaran) before landing a job as as impersonator in a down and nearly out New York nightclub.

The reviews for *Too Outrageous* were pretty much the same as for *Outrageous*.
