Teapots & Other Things

Isn't our community interesting! We seem to always find a new tempest in another teapot to consume our time, minds, and newsletter space. In case you don't know what I am referring to, I'll fill you in. A few months ago, there appeared an editorial in the Emerald City News regarding the rights of crossdressers to use the women's rooms in Seattle's public places. The point in question seems to be that a new city ordinance was interpreted

as covering cross-dresser's rights to the point that they could use the feminine facilities without fear of violating tress-passing or right to privacy statutes. The city government does not feel that this is the case and a local controversy has surfaced. From what I have been able to gather the law seems to be vague and needs further clarification. At any rate, this month, I see that this issue, specifically the point that cross-dressers and other non-females (TS's fall into this category) should not be allowed to use the lady's room. In her explanation, the editor of Twenty Club News, expounds on how this it is an invasion of . privacy and should be strongly enforced, that only females, post-op TS's and a few very passable others be allowed to use these facilities. I can see her point, and I tend to agree with her argument in general, but it's the way she makes her point, and her final words

that amaze me. In conclusion she actually made the statement that she would like to remove her clothes and compare her body with that of a TV to see who would be welcomed in the woman's room! This type of commentary is not only inappropriate, it does nothing but fuel a fire that will polarize our community. I feel that if one is accepted as a woman, then she should be able to use the women's facilities. It's not what's between a person's legs, it's what's between their ears that makes them what they are. Looking the part, being confident and acting appropriately are the criteria for almost all activities when in an alter-gender role.

The Twenty Club editor's comments have set my mind in motion identifying a number of "other things" that I feel, contribute to the successful adoption a feminine role, either full or part time. Many of these points are very subtle points. I am not speaking of the normal, "like a lady" body language, voice, or appearance topics. These are givens! I am speaking of the little things, attitudes, and attributes that are the cement, holding the image together. Without cement, the large blocks are shaky and a little pressure in the wrong direction will cause the whole structure to crumble into ruins.

What are these "other things"? Take the typical, boastful, male, "I can top that" attitude. Males have this drilled into them all their lives, starting in many cases with their father's storics about his past experiences. Women brag too, but it's not usually a contest to see who's the "king of the hill". Males also are prone to making sure everyone knows about "it", kind of like an animal repeatedly marking it's territory. Women are usually content to tell a few people and wait for the word to spread.

Men are into "things", i.e. objects, women are more apt to be involved with relationships, feelings, and emotions. When in a group, women will freely discuss their feelings and inquire about the feelings of others in the group. Men, in general, do not show

> this trait. Generally, relationships are key to a woman's happiness and state of well being. Men seem to place relationships on a secondary level, subservient to success in a career, accomplishments of a physical nature, or other creature comforts. Also, women are governed by their emotions to a much higher degree than men. Men are taught throughout their lives, not to show emotions, not to let their vulnerable inner self show. There are notable exceptions to this, many of the best and most moving lyrics, poems, art works, etc. are the product of male personas, but I would ven-ture to guess that much of the emotional energy evident in such endeavors is not carried through into the social aspects of these individuals lives. Men would agree that bared emotions can leave a person feeling very vulnerable. Being the strong person, able to fight battles and protect the home front, even if it is only one's self image,

is difficult if not possible when one is vulnerable. For a male this is the case. Why then have so many women, emotional as

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they seem to be, succeeded in the social structure? I feel the key here is not the openness of one's emotional being but the understanding of this being and the ability to understand the emotions of those around us. Being sensitive to others and relating to them appropriately, is a feminine approach. This is the one single attribute that will mark a person as feminine in a social environment.

What other "things" contribute to a person being identified as feminine? Attention to detail comes to mind. Details apply to our lives in many ways. Detail can be the arrangement of a room. Detail can be the inclusion of persons at an event. Detail can even be the way one's clothes fit or the color coordination of an outfit. Even a complete slob can exhibit some ability of paying attention to detail. Neatness and cognizance of detail can go hand in hand, but one is not synonymous with the other. I feel neatness is a innate trait and cognizance of detail tends to be more of a learned behavior. In our situation, being cross-gender individuals, detail is very important. Details are the things that will make or break that alter image that we wish to pursue. This is a skill we must endeavor to gain. Are there more "Things"?

MORE OTHER THINGS.....

You bet! Aggressiveness and arrogant behavior are not usually acceptable as feminine traits. Assertiveness and being confident are alternatives that will not draw as much attention to us. However, there is a fine line that we as trans-gender individuals should not cross, lest we be singled out for closer examination, and possible discovery. Aggressiveness is a trait that males are taught will bring them success and praise all their lives, and it becomes so incorporated in a male's personality that it can be very hard to suppress. Along with aggressiveness, usually comes the need to dominate, to tell others what is "right". When the urge to do this is present, one needs to take a moment, analyze the situation and ask oneself, "Is this being assertive or am I being the male aggressor again?". If the latter is the case, we are not truly adopting the stereotypical feminine role and might be singling ourselves out for closer investigation. Remember, our actions are just as important as our appearance, and in most cases our appearance places us at a disadvantage. Therefore, our actions must be carefully chosen and controlled. We may feel as feminine as any natural born woman inside, but physical attributes, male hormonal governed features, and years of indoctrination in the male way of thinking and acting, are very difficult obstacles to overcome.

A closing point should also be made. I am not saying that we must throw away all our male attributes in order to become accepted as a feminine individual. I say this for two reasons. First of all, in most cases, this type of purge probably is not possible. Secondly, as Virginia Prince has said, "We need to play the game with all our marbles." Initially, we do have to concentrate on perfecting feminine traits, but the old masculine traits will always be part of our nature. Locking them up inside with no chance to express them will only create new frustrations. When we have reached the point where we have established ourselves, are comfortable, and are understood by an individual or group, all our traits should be allowed to surface. Now the complete person will have a chance to grow. However, if we are to succeed, we have to initially tilt the scales and concentrate on the stereotypical feminine traits. The reward is our acceptance as the feminine persona we desire to be. The alternative is discomfort, ridicule, and possibly public humiliation as a "guy in a dress". If this is a risk we choose to take, a goal we feel is worth the efforts, then we must concentrate on these and other "things", follow our dreams, and

A Facilitator's Thoughts By: Odile

For eight weeks I have been the facilitator of a rap group composed of individuals who are members of A Rose. At the onset of the group I was excited about the prospect of being able to learn and hopefully understand gender dysphoria. I wanted to understand because I had come to care very much about the people I had met at A Rose. And yes, I have come to understand but my understanding is not what I expected it would be. I think I wanted an intellectual understanding. What I have gotten is an understanding on a much deeper level, and I have grown in my humanness.

Although I was not aware that I was doing so, I was evaluating statements made by the participants. I might say to myself something like "right on" "she's so wrong" "that's weird" "she's all wet". Somewhere along the way I realized I was doing this and began to listen without evaluating. Then I began to hear the statement and to try to move into that person's world to feel and hear her reality. I have been learning to understand what the meaning of a statement is to the person who made it. I am learning to allow myself to empathetically enter into another person's feelings about herself and her world. In so doing, I have also allowed myself to accept where she is in her growth.

I believe, as Carl Rogers does, that a person can grow only when a relationship exists with another person that gives total acceptance. A person cannot go forward in becoming until she is both accepted and self-accepting of just who she is. You can't find your way to Flagstaff if you don't know whether you are in Phoenix or Los Angeles.

As I have become more aware of myself and my realities as mirrored to me from the group, I find that I am able to stop myself from rushing in to help, to fix things, or to decide how someone should be helped. I don't want to decide what is right for anyone, what anyone needs, or try to sway anyone to my beliefs. I am learning to let others -- and myself -- "just be."

At the beginning of the group I stated that my goal for the group was that the members would become supportive of each other and deal with each other on a feeling level. I have come to understand that each person must have her own goal and that I have no right to set a goal for any one person or for the group. My job as facilitator is to accept each person in the group just where she is and be there with love and acceptance as she moves through her process.

Some group members have told me that I can't understand what they are going through because I am a genetic female. My biological state is a fact to be understood on an intellectual level, not a feeling one. The feelings experienced by the group members are human feelings. We all experience a wide range of feelings: pain, fear, sense of not belonging, sadness, envy, joy, pleasure, frustration, confusion, anger, loneliness, hurt, rejection, etc. Therefore, I believe that with love and empathy, each of us can understand another person's feelings. I may not have experienced this particular situation but I have experienced all of the feelings at one time or another during my life.

I have seen a great deal of growth in the individuals in the group and I have seen a warm, loving community develop. I had expected this to happen but somehow I didn't expect me to grow as much as I have. I have grown in my ability to hear without evaluating so that now I am able to truly hear with my ears and emotions. I "hear" with feeling and with this has come an understanding and caring that I could not have imagined. I am more in touch with my own process now, and I know that I will continue to experience personal growth through my participation in this group.

I love the uniqueness of each person in our group and I feel a closeness to them that I don't know how to express. I do know that I want to continue to love and support each member in any way they want or need. A group that began to help those persons with gender dysphoria has become a growth and support group for me. Thank you, group members, for being so loving.

If any A Rose members are interested in growing along with us in our group, we ask that you make a four-week commitment (we meet once a week) and talk to Dee prior to coming to your first meeting.

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
