Great-grandfather was wearing the unisex look 100 years before the word was invented. In other words, "Dresses were 'in' for 19th century boys.'

This piece of information comes from consultant Elsie McMurry, professor emeritus of the department of design and environmental analysis in the State College of Human Ecology.

She reached this conclusion after looking through two centuries of children's clothes in the Cornell University cos-tume collection. "Dresses were standard garb for all, youngsters in the 19th centu-

Seek Advice Of Counselor

Q. I have a son who is 16 years old.

I am a little worried about him. He seems to want to dress up as a girl when he thinks I am not around. He gets bras of min", pantyhose, etc., fro my dresser. I found a c ess of mine removed.

Should I take him to a psy-hologist, or is this just a phase he is going through? Should I mention this to him and chastise him? I am quite upset. --Mrs. A.W.

A. This is a difficult probably confused about doesn't lend itself to easy correction.

I think it would be safe to say that the boy is prbably confused about sex drives at this point in his life. Perhaps the im-portant phrase is "at this time in his life." He time in his life." He knows he is a male anatomically, but has some urge to be female, at least during these episodes of which you speak.

Some transvestites (that is the label) get a sexual stimulation by dressing in clothes of the opposite the transsexual individual, who rejects his sex.

This boy's problem may have existed from early years. Maternal dominance or paternal neglect can be factors. But it would be important to analyze his other behavior patterns. Does he show feminine traits? Does he have male friends? Does he engage in sports with male friends?

It is my understanding that at 16 little can be done. Transvestites do have heterosexual urges, will marry and have children. If strong-willed enough, social pressures can convince them to a b a n d o n their urges to "cross-dress."

It would be a good idea to talk to a counselor psychiatrist or psycholo-gist — either of whom can give you hints on how to handle the problem. I pwould not chastise the boy. I would casually ask him what your dress was doing in his room. Accept his answer - or his silence.

ry," she explained. "Small boys and girls were dressed in short frocks, at least until the age of five or six," she continued. "Just as little girls of today blithely don slacks like their brothers', in the 1800s the custom was reversed.

Those ancestral pictures in the attic will show that it was hard to tell the boys from the girls even in the good old days, at least until they left the toddler stage, McMurry pointed out.

"No one seemed to worry about dressing a small child in 'masculine' or 'feminine'

Once children reached their

age five. Then at age seven or 10 he was "breeched," donning

his first trousers and losing his baby locks.

What can these 19th century ideas about proper dress children reveal to the 20th cen-tury observer? A study of fashion shows that social attitudes are always in flux, no matter how proper a dress (or an

idea), seems at the time. For example, 19th century adult attitudes required that small children wear pantaloons, pantalets or stockings under their dresses to cover lower limbs. Legs simply were never acknowledged in that pre-mini era, and children's

legs were no exception. "What's proper and correct seems so permanent to one generation it's hard to believe it can ever change," McMurry said. "For example, what grandmother today would dream of choosing pink for her grandson? Yet in the 1800s pink was the proper color for little boys and blue for little girls.

"One 1860 boy's dress in the Cornell collection has a tiny floral pattern and pink stripes - much too feminine for the taste of some little girls today," McMurry said.
