he International Foundation for Gender Education, recently received a grant for \$11,000 from the Gill Foundation, a private foundation based in Colorado Springs. The direct grant will be used by IFGE to assist with general operating expenses. This is the first time IFGE has received a grant from Gill Foundation.

IFGE Executive Director Nancy Nangeroni is very excited about this grant, "We are very pleased to receive this grant from the Gill Foundation. The grant comes at an important time in this organization, as we are responding to the monumental changes in the transgender community - including our emergence as part of a significant new social movement -by revitalizing our organization with renewed focus and energy. We see this grant as an indication that we are on the right track in our commitment to providing advocacy and education on behalf of all people of diverse gender expression and identity. We are particularly proud of and grateful

to the Gill Foundation for being among the leaders in funding transgender community effort."

The Gill Foundation was established in 1994 by Tim Gill, the founder and chairman of Quark, Inc., a Denver-based computer software company. The Gill Foundation supports the needs of under-served and under-funded communities in their pursuit of justice and equality by focusing its grants on programs for gay men, lesbians, bisexuals, transgender, and issues related to HIV/AIDS. In addition to grantmaking, the foundation operates special programs such as the OutGiving Project which provides technical assistance and other resources to support the communities it serves. Tim Gill and the Gill Foundation, which has offices in Colorado and Washington, DC, have provided over \$10 million to hundreds of community organizations. 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IFGE RESPONDS TO NEWSWEEK ON BOYS

In response to the May 11th, Newsweek cover story "How to Build a Better Boy". IFGE has sent a letter to Newsweek critical of the piece for it's stereotyping of boys' behavior and lack of consideration of gender diversity.

Says IFGE executive director Nancy Nangeroni, "Responding to media about gender is something that IFGE, as one of our comunity's most visible organizations, is particularly well suited to do. Every gender-related story is an opportunity to raise people's consciouness about the variability of gender expression and identity. We don't do enough of this, but at least this time, we were able to respond."

EDITORIAL

An important part of IFGE's mission is interaction with the media. Recently Newsweek ran an article "Boys will be Boys" (May 11th, 1998). While reminding its readership of the importance of attending to the needs of developing males, the article unfortunately reinforced a narrow definition of masculinity.

Many children want to explore the middleground that divides boys and girls. As humans, kids discern who they are by exploring the limits of their world and themselves. Allowing children this playful exploration is a vital part of rearing a healthy, emotionally stable child.

IFGE takes the stance that asserting the questionable value of mainstreaming a child's identity (gender, ideological, or otherwise) without a reminder of the healthyness of individual exception, jeopardises the natural maturation of a person during the seminal years of childhood. This kind of ommission encourages parents to make 'normal' children through a process of guidance which has as its end constricted behaviour modeled upon social conventions. As our community testifies, such mainstreaming causes children not only immediate hurt, but long term distress. Far too many people today suffer from childhoods marred by punishment for transgressions of the 'norm'. IFGE maintains that the greatest care which any child can receive comes from unconditional love, reinforcing selfesteem, and teaching social responsibility. A vital part of this responsibility is the respect (not mere tolerance) and encouragement of diversity. As one framer of the United States Constitution wrote "the more plurality the better".

International Commentary

s the co-editor of Transgender, coordinator of international and national resources, and philosopher involved in contemplating and reconstructing IFGE's identity in light of 'Vision 2000', I often reflect upon the guestion "what IS IFGE". The last several months afforded me the opportunity to answer this question with increasing clarity and certainty, and I want to share with you my observations and aspirations as you and I take this opportunity to become aquainted. You may notice that I understand our relationship as a dialogue. I sincerely value your responce to my thoughts - for without such interaction our relationship ceases, and the potential good we can achieve together dries up.

IFGE does well for a foundation whose only office is in New England. The organisation is nationally recognised and includes members from across the country. However, to be as effective as I believe we can, IFGE needs to more actively interface with grassroot communities throughout the United States. Efforts are already underway to establish networks and coordinators in 10 areas of the contiguous states, as well as Hawaii, but we need your support. Endovors such as this are only successful if people donate their and ti me energy. Organisations like Press For Change, a transgender lobbying group based out of Manchester in the United Kingdom, achieve fundamental civil liberties for our community because dedicated people volunteer legal expertiese, knowledge of web design, and a host of other talents for the betterment of all. Community is rooted in this committment to helping each other. By your act of membership you consider yourself part of this community, and more important than any financial gift is the gift of yourself. If you can act as a regional co-ordinator, or would like to work with several others to network the resources in your area of the United States, please contact me.

I mention Press For Change consciously. After just returning from the conference Gender, Sexuality, and Law held in Staffordshire, UK, I more fully realise that the American trans community can learn a considerable amount from, and offer much to, our foreign brothers and sisters. From the beginning of my tenure at IFGE I took seriously the INTERNATIONAL in our name. Now I see our committment to the world community less as a luxury and more as a necessity. It is wonderful that Transgender magazine sees a number of international subscribers, and relays a selection of international news; however, to accurately call ourselves an international foundation, and to survive in a world shrinking at ever increasing rates through the ease of international communication over the internet. IFGE needs to establish credible working relationships with organisations and individuals from around the world. The first, and easier step as Westerners, is to approach the more familiar cultures of Europe. Towards this end, I am attending several conferences in the United Kingdom over the next several months, , including the Third International Congress on Sex and Gender to be held at Exeter College, Oxford University in September. Understanding IFGEs financial situation I have offered to absorb a significant portion of the expense for these important trips myself.

The reason for such a pro-active position?: The social conditions which face our foreign brethren are not the same we face in the United States. The only wav to get even an approximate picture of what those conditions are is to become involved with the people shaping them. The time is come to aquaint ourselves with the manners of gender expression, and particular issues confronting gender freedom and human rights, in other cultures. Fulfilling this commitment will take some time, but I am confident that with support the first steps will come quickly.

Part of IFGEs mission is to help all people transcend limiting gender norms. Gender is ubiquitous: it is not merely the private playground of the western transvestite and transsexual. The transgender community is in a unique position to help the mainstream deconstruct narrow, limiting notions of what it means to perform male and/or female. It is time we live up to that responsibility. Fulfilling this commitment will require that we draw upon our inner strengths and resolve, and that we welcome and embrace those from other communities who reach out to help us carry our load - for this is not our task alone, but in a very real way the struggle of every person to realise his and her potential as a human being.

IFGE ATTENDS APA CONFERENCE IN TORONTO

epresentatives of IFGE attended the international convention of the American Psychiatric Association in Toronto this past May 31-June 3, to represent transgender concerns to the professional psychiatric community.

Their purpose was both to increase transgender visibility with the APA, and to collect information that could be used in working towards GID reform. IFGE board member Yvonne Cook-Riley, who managed IFGE's participation, met with Dr. George Brown, who previously served on the GID committee. She was told by Dr. Brown that the publishing of DSM-V is planned for the year 2003 or 2004, and that the committee work towards the revision will be started sometime within the next two years. "This challenges the transgender community," says Ms. Cook-Riley, "to seriously consider

what we are looking for in a diagnosis for insurance purposes."

This year, reportedly for the first time at APA, there were two seminars on transgender issues. One of the presentations, by Katherine Wilson of the Gender Identity Center of Colorado and Dr. James Dotson of the San Francisco Center for Special Problems, focused on GID and reasons for its removal from DSM in connection with fetishistic transvestism and cross-dressing. Ms. Wilson compared the GID situation with the gay issue 25 years

There was also a showing of the recent documentary "You Don't Know Dick" which explored FTM trans-sexualism.

Also representing IFGE at the convention was executive director Nancy Nangeroni, who reports: "I personally spoke with psychiatrists from Sweden, Israel, Venezuela, Turkey, Australia, New Zealand, India, Saudi Arabia, and the United Kingdom, and more. Some of these countries - such as Saudi Arabia - are extremely repressive around issues of gender diversity, and I took this opportunity to advocate strongly with the individuals I met for challenges to their norms. It was a welcome opportunity to advocate on behalf of those living in environments less permissive than what we enjoy in the United States."

IFGE's presence was supported by the local Toronto support group, Xpressions, whose members helped staff the booth on the convention floor and also provided accomodations and transportation for the visiting IFGE representatives. IFGE acknowledges Miqqi Gilbert and (IFGE board member) Pam Geddes for putting Yvonne and Nancy up for the duration of their stay, as well as Lillian and Christina, who worked on the convention floor along with Miggi, Yvonne, and Nancy.

ABBY SAYPEN RESIGNS CHAIR OF WSF

At a Friday IFGE Board meeting during the "Crossing Borders" convention in Toronto, Winslow Street Fund (WSF) chairperson Abby Saypen indicated that

she would resign from the chair position. She will remain as a fund trustee. Taking over the chair position, though as yet officially unappointed, will be Michelle Miles, a longtime trustee. Abby's stated reason for resigning was that she was "tired of it."

Michelle's first duty as new chair will be to find and appoint 2-4 new trustees. Following that, it will be the job of the new committee to draft a set of guidelines for nature, purpose, and administration of the fund, including guidelines for contributors.

Significantly, several members of the IFGE board spoke of their commitment to seeing the fund remain an asset of IFGE, as it was always intended. Indeed, it is common practice for an organization to maintain an endowment fund which serves as both philanthropic institution and safety net for the organization overall. It seems likely that, barring compelling reason to do otherwise, this will be the course for WSF.

The fund served its purpose in helping IFGE through a difficult late fall, effectively guaranteeing its own continued health.

to grow, I am looking for new ways to meet the needs of the community. We have just dropped our shipping charges and are presently training a few volunteers, so that we can expand our business hours. I also would like to start a 'Friends of Synchronicity' program - whereby a person could sponsor a new title as a way of showing support for our educational efforts. The concept is simple: the supporter (Friend) provides the capital necessary for the first shipment of books of a new title (generally between \$250 and \$350). In return, the sponsor gets the first copy as well as a letter of thanks.

Another thought for further development could be a Book Club, where avid readers could interact by sharing their thoughts on new titles. This could be done by meeting in person, or over the internet.

As we all work together, we really are making a difference for those who are coming out after us. The bookstore is one of our most powerful resources

for freeing one's spirit, through self education. We love for you to get involved.


TRANSGENDER TAPESTRY EDITOR NAMED

Il of us at the IFGE office in are pleased to announce that new co-editor for Transgender magazine will be Matthew Carlos. Matthew has been working in the IFGE office with us for several months, first as a volunteer offering to edit the personals, then as a consultant working on grant proposals and refocusing IFGE on its Vision 2000 mission. Matthew holds a degree in political science from Providence College, and has studied philosophy in the graduate programmes of the New School for Social Research, Brown University, and Fordham University. He has taught philosophy for colleges in New York and Connecticut (including a course on identity construction), given several professional addresses, written articles and book reviews, edited four books for publication, and is currently authoring a few books of his own.

Matthew identifies with a new era of transgender people: those who do not construct their

identity around any specific gender role(s), and in that way he considers his work to "transgender the traditional transgender community." Though he does not identify as a crossdresser or transsexual, he does enjoy indulging in an androgynous presentation. "I believe that future generations will live lives free of bi-polar gender norms. We see some of this in the way the feminist movement freed up women's gender presentation, and there are those of us continuing that important socially re-constructive work today. I hope that our children, or perhaps our grandchildren will no longer feel pressured to choose gender identities, but can live, be accepted, and be nurtured simply for who they are - however, to bring this about I must be who I am, celebrating all my individual complexity and denying nothing of my full self."

Late in May, Matthew attended Seattle's *Esprit* to familiarise himself with our west coast community, become aquatinted with its activists, writers, and leaders, and to promote participation in

THE AWARDS SELECTION PROCESS

The Virginia Prince and Trinity Awards are the transgender community's highest awards. Although these awards are sponsored by IFGE and coordinated by the IFGE Awards Committee, they are not intended to be IFGE's awards. Nominations are open to the entire transgender community. The final selection is made by a body of experienced and respected members and friends of the transgender community, who have agreed to serve on the Selections Academy and vote for the recipients. The members of the Selections Academy are not necessarily members of IFGE, and must not be a current Director of IFGE. Since the nominations are made by the transgender community at large, and the final selections are made by the Academy, these awards are truly the transgender community's awards.

SCHEDULE FOR PROCESSING THE VIRGINIA PRINCE AND TRINITY AWARDS:

- (1) Eight months before the Annual IFGE Convention, the Awards Committee sends a call for nominations to members of IFGE and other members and friends of the transgender community. The nomination forms are returned to the Chair of the Awards Committee.
- (2) Six months prior to the Convention, the Awards Committee prepares ballots for the two awards, listing all valid candidates with statements supporting their nominations, and mails these ballots to the Selections Academy.
- (3) Each member of the Selections Academy marks their ballot and returns it to the Awards Committee. The votes are counted and the recipients of the Virginia Prince and Trinity Awards are notified four months prior to the Convention.
- (4) The Awards are presented at special ceremonies during the Convention.

CRITERIA OF ELIGIBILITY FOR THE VIRGINIA PRINCE LIFETIME CONTRIBUTION AWARD:

The Virginia Prince Award is given to a person who has made a lifetime contribution to our community. The recipient must:

- (1) Be a living member of the transgender community.
- (2) Be a leader or pioneer who has been instrumental in the development of the community.
- (3) Have actively served the transgender community for a minimum of ten years.

CRITERIA OF ELIGIBILITY FOR A TRINITY AWARD:

The Trinity Award acknowledges heros and heroines of the transgender community, people who have performed extraordinary acts of love and courage. Everyone is eligible to receive this award; they need not be transgendered themselves. They can be any living individual or couple. Also eligible are small groups of individuals, identified by name, who have closely collaborated in performing the acts for which the award is intended. Look for little known or unacknowledged people who have done something extraordinary.

CRITERIA OF ELIGIBILITY FOR A PARTNERS IN DIVERSITY AWARD:

This award was instituted in 1996 to recognize companies, corporations, and government agencies that have adopted comprehensive policies of diversity regarding employment and service to customers or clients. The policy must be all-inclusive, specifying non-discrimination on the basis of race, ethnicity, religion, sex, sexual orientation, or disabilities, as well as transgender. The Awards Committee will seek documentation to verify the eligibility of any nominees, and make recommendations to the IFGE Board of Directors, who will determine the final selection.
